Another table covered in white cloth, was used to serve punch and "love knots."

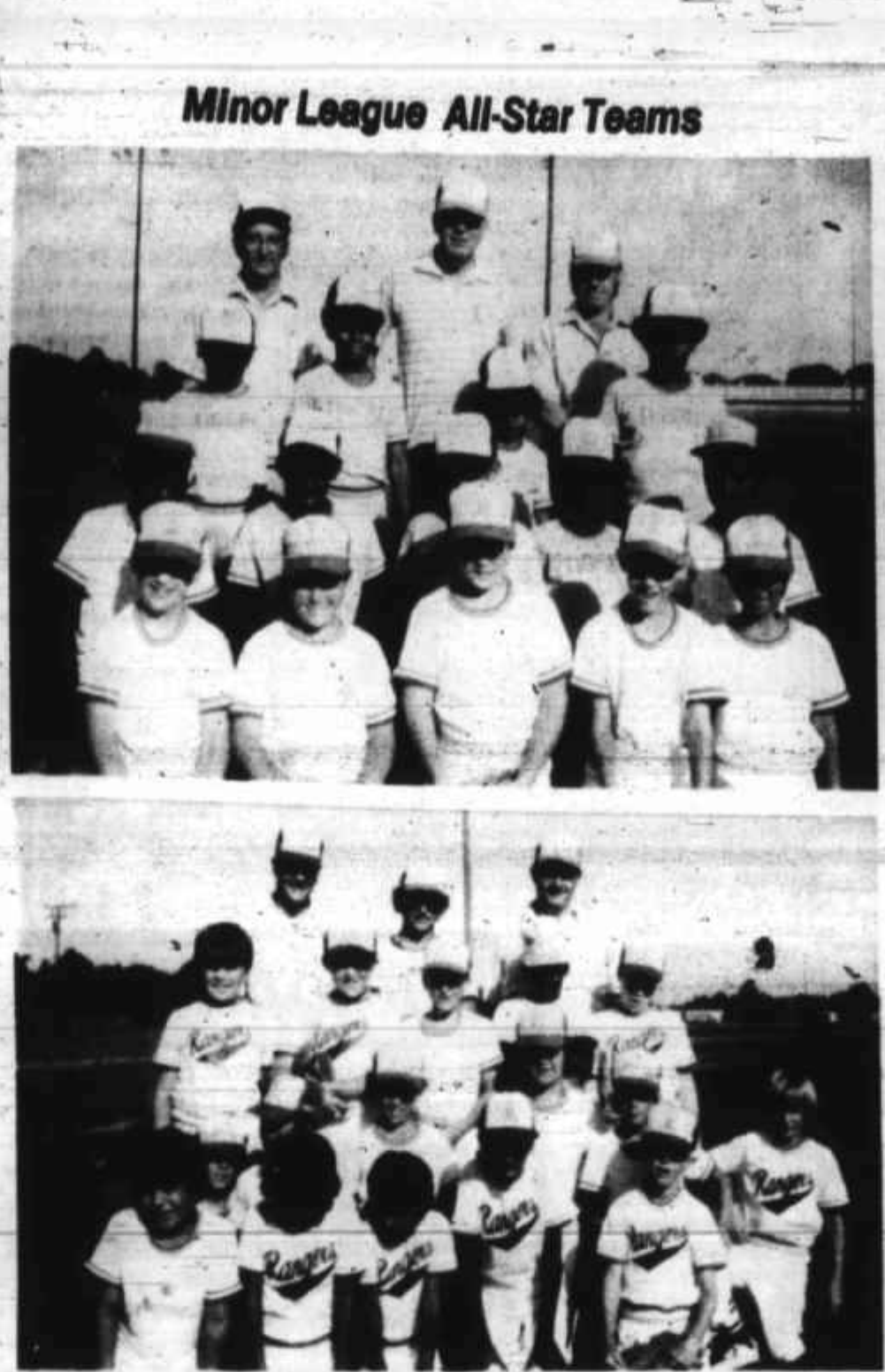
A wedding dinner was followed by a dance. The bride and groom led the grand march.
