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County Buys 2 Radios For Sheriff's Department

Juvenile Misconduct Discussed At Special Session Monday

Colorado County Commissioners' Court Monday authorized the purchase of two new radios for the County Sheriff's Department under a Criminal Justice program at a cost to the county of \$725.20.

County Judge Lester Crank told the court that the Houston-Galveston Area Council's Criminal Justice Dept. is taking bids for radios and that 75% of the costs for such radios would be paid under the Governor's Criminal Justice program and 25% by the county. General Electric has bid \$1295 each for the 110 watt mobile units, of which this county will be required to pay only 25% or \$725.20. Delivery is expected in a month, according to Chief Deputy Sheriff Jim Broussard who was present for the session Monday.

One of the radios will be placed into a vehicle owned by special sheriff's deputy Alvin Cernoch in the Weimar area and the other will be kept in the sheriff's office in the jail for use as a spare in case of a breakdown in any of the units now in use in this department.

Broussard said this will save the county money and save time when radios break down; and increase the efficiency of the department.

The court voted unanimously to make the purchase. Precinct 1 Commissioner Otto Loessing noted that the use of the radios may become increasingly important as the gasoline shortage continues, limiting the amount of gasoline that might be available for patrolling.

Misconduct Charged
Stout, residents of the Garden Lane area north of Columbus, met with the court to seek assistance in controlling maliciousness in their area. They noted that problems especially arise during the fireworks season and told the court that residents have often been terrorized, fires started, mail boxes damaged and other malicious damage caused.

Judge Crank pointed out that the court does not have the authority to pass ordinances to prohibit shooting of fireworks outside city limits.

Mrs. Stout and other residents of the area (also present were Mrs. Bernice Kahlden and Brandon Vickery) want to know what needs to be done to protect themselves from arson, thievery and vandalism.
