House Passes Panama Treaty 224 to 202

On June 21 the House voted 224 to 202 to pass legislation to implement the Panama Canal Treaties of 1977. I voted for the legislation on final passage, although I voted for some other amendments during the debate which reflected my own preferences.

Yet, there was a great deal of misinformation circulated about this legislation which got in the way of people seeing its real purpose. Whether one agrees with the Panama treaties or not, the fact is that under our Constitution the treaties were ratified by the Senate. They are now the law of the land. The law must be implemented.

During the past weeks, many of us who were not entirely sold on the treaties had to think very hard about our votes. We searched for alternatives. But the only answer was that the treaties were law, and we must find the responsible way to implement them which would be in the best interest of the United States.

Not to pass legislation would have meant certain confusion about the status of the canal. It was entirely

Improper Gasoline Storage An Explosive Situation

With Texas motorists becoming increasingly concerned over short supplies of gasoline and strict allocation plans in the state's major metropolitan areas, a dangerous problem could become critical—the improper storage of gasoline.

Doug Williams of Dallas, chairman of the Texas Automobile Insurance Service Office, suggests the only safe place to store gasoline may be in your car or truck's fuel tank or in an approved gasoline storage container in a well-ventilated area. A gasoline can stored in the trunk of a car is like carrying a bomb that could go off at any minute.

Technicians have compared the destructive force of a two-gallon can of gasoline to that of several sticks of dynamite. Williams said, "A spark from starting the engine, the flame of lighting a cigarette, or the impact of a collision could blow the vehicle apart, causing death or injury."

Thus, what might look like a convenient way to beat a gasoline shortage on the road or in the home could have

tragic side effects if precautions are not taken. Here are a few tips from TAIISO:

—Keep all gasoline in containers tightly capped if they contain any fuel.

—Once a container is empty and thoroughly ventilated, leave the cap off to allow fumes from the remaining drops of gasoline to evaporate.

—Never put gasoline in anything but a container specifically designed for fuel.

—Keep gasoline where only an adult can get it. The smell of gasoline is often intriguing to children; don't let their curiosity cause them or anyone else harm.

—Stored gasoline must be kept away from heat and flame. Remember that gasoline will expand in volume as temperature rises and may seep out of even the best container.

Five day forecasts maintain a daily chance for showers and thunderstorms across the Coastal Plains. Buildups of the scattered rains should be limited more to the late afternoon and evening hours. Temperatures and humid south winds won't change much even though a weak front is now over central areas of the state.

Dealing with showers and thunderstorms could be a bigger factor the rest of the week. Be sure to check area radar reports and local sky conditions before making chemical applications. This could help you avoid costly washoff. Moisture will generally be good for pastures and young crops. However, hay baling could be much more erratic. Dew and showers could combine to keep curing rates low. Plant diseases will also tend to develop quicker where showers and dew create long periods of humid conditions. Adjustments to fungicide treatments may be in order.

Make July 4th Holiday Meals Safe Ones

July 4th meals are fun—but make them safe.

A picnic in the park or supper in the backyard can make the holiday one to remember, but prepare and serve the food safely to be sure the memory is a pleasant one.

Food poisoning bacteria thrive in temperatures between 50-120 degrees F. So consumers can start right from the grocery store to make the food safe for picnics or barbecues.

Buy ground beef a day or two before the holiday unless it can be frozen for a longer time. Shop in a store that displays meat and poultry in a clean refrigerated area. Avoid packages that have been broken or have punctured wrappers.

Thaw frozen meat in the refrigerator to prevent bacterial growth. Don't allow this meat to stand out unrefrigerated for more than an hour at the most.

And be sure to cook hamburgers and hot dogs in batches small enough to be used quickly so they don't stand—allowing bacteria to grow.

Also, cleanliness in preparing food is always important—but especially with hamburgers. Always wash hands thoroughly with soap and hot water before and after handling raw meat.

Baked beans is another dish that shouldn't be kept at room temperature for more than two hours.

Bacteria grow well in eggs at room temperature. Leave boiled eggs out of potato salad unless it is refrigerated until serving time. Make potato salad with eggs the

same day it is to be served. Turning to exact directions for avoiding foodborne illness. Keep perishable foods cold, at or below 40 degrees F. Foods in this category are cream pies, seafood and dishes made with eggs, fish, meat and poultry.

Or keep the perishable foods, such as seafood, poultry and cooked meats, hot—about 140 degrees F. Bacteria grow best in lukewarm foods, so never let these foods stand at room temperature for more than two hours.

Often foodborne illness is mistaken for a simple "bug" or virus. The real cause may be that the food wasn't properly handled, prepared or served. This can be prevented by serving hot foods hot and cold foods cold.
