Sealy Man Shot Thurs. At Rester's

Colorado County sheriff's department investigated a shooting at Rester's Place near the intersection of FM Road 949 and IH 10 on Thurs., June 28th.

The report came in to the sheriff's office at 5:15 p.m. that a shooting had occurred. Investigation by deputies revealed that two Mexican males from Sealy entered the building and asked for a six pack of beer. The owner, Harry Rester, declined to sell the beer noting that the two had already had too much to drink.

One of the men reportedly made an obscene remark in the presence of a woman and Rester grabbed a gun and told the men to leave the premises. When outside one of the men reportedly turned as if to attack Rester and Rester fired a 22-magnum pistol and struck the man, Cecil P. Sanchez, 37, in the stomach. The bullet reportedly came out of his back. He was taken to Columbus hospital for treatment and later transferred by Life-Flight helicopter to a Houston hospital.

The other man Pedro Garcia, 23, was not charged. Rester was charged with aggravated assault and his case will be turned over to the next grand jury for its consideration.

Garwood Man Seriously Hurt In Shooting Sunday Night

A Garwood black man was seriously injured in a shooting at Garwood Sunday night and he was transferred to a Houston hospital by Life-Flight helicopter after being treated at Eagle Lake Community Hospital.

Sheriff's Deputy Mike Trammell of Garwood was called to a disturbance reported at a home in Garwood at around 7:45 p.m. All appeared to be in order. But 30 minutes later the Eagle Lake Community Hospital notified the sheriff's office that a man had been admitted with a gunshot wound.

The man Roscoe Stephens reportedly was arguing with a brother-in-law, Carl G. Johnson, over a 32-caliber rifle and the two reportedly were scuffling for the gun when it went off and the bullet struck Stephens in the shoulder and lodged in the chest cavity near the spine.

Deputy Sheriff Lope Villarreal assisted Trammell in investigating the shooting.

Johnson has been charged with aggravated assault and his bond was set at \$2500 by Justice of the Peace W. A. Hedger of Garwood, pending action by the next grand jury.

Stephens was taken to a hospital in Houston and is expected to survive.

A search was conducted in the wooded area near the Franklin home and Willis B. Shivers, 24, of Magee, Wisconsin was arrested.

Further investigation revealed that he had in his possession some marijuana and what is believed to be metamphetamine. He was charged for possession of both of these items and with criminal trespassing.

Bond had not been set at our press time Monday by Justice of the Peace Richard C. Schmidt in J.P. Precinct 1.

Rice CISD Waives Agricultural Land Tax Change, Keeps Autos On Roll

Articles Included
In Tax Relief Legislation

The Rice Consolidated School District's board of education met Monday night and took action to implement some of the provisions of the new H.B. 1040 or the "Tax Relief Amendment" passed by the last Legislature.

Articles of the house bill became effective with the signing of the bill and are now in effect, however the board was given the right to waive some articles until 1980.

Business Manager Roy Marshall provisions of the bill to the board.

Article 1 calls for reappraisal of agricultural lands. Marshall said that under the article, all land in the district is valued at market value but the farmer has the option to apply for assessment on the basis of productivity. If not farmed for five of the last seven years, the land must be placed on the rolls at the market value, explained the business manager.

The local school boards were given the option to waive this article until January 1, 1980 since much work has already been done on the tax roll for 1979 and the Rice board approved a resolution waiving this article until Jan. 1, 1980.

Article 2 deals with timber lands for sale and does not apply generally in this county, said Marshall; the district has been exempting intangible properties, as set out in Article 3, and also has been exempting household goods not used to make a profit, as required in Article 4.

Autos Stay On Roll

Article 5 relates to exemption of automobiles from the tax rolls and is left up to the option of the local jurisdiction. Marshall told the board that the district would lose around \$300,000 to \$400,000 in assessed values if autos were removed from the tax roll and in light of already decreasing valuations in the district, he recommended that the option to waive this provision be approved. The board approved a resolution waiving the exemption on automobiles. Such action will be required on an annual basis if the board wishes to continue.

25% Turnover In Rice CISD Faculties In '79-80

Ten Resignations Accepted, 9 Hired

Acting Supt. Charles DeShazo informed the Rice Consolidated School District's board of education Monday night that approximately 25% of the professional staff of the Rice District has resigned and will need to be replaced prior to the opening of the 1979-80 school year.

He pointed out a critical shortage in science, math, physical education and special education teachers and also noted that many of the late resignations in the Rice District are making replacements "almost impossible." He added that the talent is not to be found among the universities graduating teachers.

DeShazo told the board that because of economics, many with teaching degrees are going into other areas of work. Some of the reasons cited by DeShazo for the unusually high number of resignations this year include: moving to another district with higher pay, moving to another district nearer home, assume role of fulltime homemaker, leaving the teaching profession, teaching at a higher level in another
