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Rep. Wilson Discusses Actions of Legislature

Says Nicest Thing Is "It's All Over"

The Honorable John Wilson, State Representative for this district, from La Grange, was the guest speaker at the meeting of the Eagle Lake Lions Club last Thursday and brought the Lions and guests some enlightening information on the work of the past State Legislature. Rep. Wilson expressed disappointment in the actions of the Legislature, noting that "the best thing that happened during the session, is that it's all over."

He noted that the special interests dominated the Legislature and commented that "almost every piece of legislation passed and either signed or vetoed by the Governor, was of benefit to some special interests."

Some of the legislation was discussed by the representative. He noted that the increase in the usury rates approved by the Legislature was a major piece of legislation and authorized savings and loans institutions to increase maximum rates from ten to twelve percent for a limited two year period.

The automobile dealers won approval of a \$25 documentary fee for license and tax paper work on a new car. Wilson said the \$25 can be tacked on at the very end of the cost of a vehicle even though a negotiated figure has been agreed upon.

Package Stores Winners
Wilson took exception to another piece of legislation, "the beer bill" which will become effective Sept. 1, 1979 and will prohibit wholesale beer dealers from making "dock sales." All sales can be through retail permit outlets only, noted Wilson, and he predicted that this will increase the costs to the consumer. "The package stores are the only winners from this piece of legislation," he said. He said the package store lobby is one of the strongest in the state capital.

Two of the most "far-reaching" bills, House Bill 1060, "Tax-Relief Amendment," and Senate Bill 621, known as

the Pavito Bill, drew the greatest interest in Wilson's address.

He charged that H. B. 1060, although it is called the tax relief bill, is not a tax relief bill but rather a reallocation bill and he stated that the average citizen, especially in the rural areas, will be hardest hit by provisions of the new bill.

"I would consider a tax relief bill as one that would cut taxes, but as far as I can see, there's going to be no reduction in taxes under H.B. 1060," said the representative. He added as a final note that one point in favor of the Legislature, as passed by the state ad valorem tax.

Wharton Co. Station Operators Nix Rationing

Gasoline retailers in El Campo and Wharton agreed on at least one thing Monday night, July 9th - they do not want the odd-even system of gasoline rationing imposed on them by the state.

The meeting, which was held in the Wharton County courthouse, was precipitated by a meeting last Tuesday of Commissioners Court. At that meeting the court was prepared to ask Gov. Bill Clements to include Wharton County in his mandatory odd-even system of gasoline rationing, an act which many surrounding counties have already done. The latest will fall under the governor's system midnight tonight.

Following the July 3rd meeting of Commissioners Court, several gasoline retailers said that they would like to try to work out the problem themselves. Retailers and concerned citizens in West Wharton County met Monday at noon at El Campo City Hall and came up with two proposals.

El Campans voted unanimously against the odd-even program, as did Wharton retailers at a similar meeting in Wharton July 9th. El Campo Leader News.
