Seymour's Honored At FPP Dedication Friday

Cong. Pickle Says Energy Problem Will Be Met

In spite of threatening weather a large crowd of citizens from Central Texas and dignitaries attended the official dedication of the Sam K. Seymour, Jr., Generating Station at the Fayette Power Project last Friday morning. Light rain forced the activities of the dedication ceremony from an area in front of the administration building into the cafeteria auditorium, dampening the enthusiasm of the praise heaped on Mr. and Mrs. Sam K. Seymour, Jr. of Columbus. Mr. Seymour, active on the Lower Colorado River Authority's board for over 34 years, had the distinction of having the new generating station named in his honor.

Before the rain began to fall, those gathered for the occasion were entertained by a short concert by the La Grange High School band directed by Ed Lowes. John H. Nash, Jr. of the LCRA Austin dedication committee, presided at the event and welcomed all who came for this momentous occasion and to pay tribute to Sam K. Seymour, Jr. for his 34 years of outstanding service on the LCRA board. The Rev. Henry L. Teems, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Columbus, gave the opening invocation. Among the dignitaries introduced by Mr. Nash were: present and past members of the LCRA board of directors, other LCRA officers, the City of Austin mayor and councilmen and city manager; State Rep. John Wilson and Congressman J.J. Pickle who was to be the speaker for the event.

McEllan noted that all people of the area are beneficiaries of a rich heritage and stressed a continued need for cooperation in order to strengthen the source of electrical power in the future. She praised the work of Congressman J.J. Pickle whom she described as a "watchdog for LCRA." She commended him for his interest in behalf of LCRA and rural electrical cooperatives in the state and acknowledged that "he is a great voice on the national scene."

Common Spirit of Endeavor The Congressman told the gathering that the dedication of the Fayette Power Project was a landmark in the history of the state and the nation. He said that "we in Congress, do understand the energy problem... we may have our differences, but we will pursue a solution and we will come out on top." He stressed the fact that this can be accomplished only by "coming together as a team."

The Congressman told the gathering that there is plenty of oil and gas in the United States and that we must increase domestic production of oil and gas and adding that this can only be accomplished by decontrolling the industry. He said that the United States must also increase its use of lignite and coal. In referring to the vast abundance of oil and gas still left in the ground in the U.S., the Congressman said, "we know where it is and we need to go after it, although it's going to be an expensive process." He indicated that there could be as much as 25-45 billion barrels of oil in reserves in the United States.

But we need to give the companies in the oil and gas industry the incentive to go after it," he stated. "The increased use of coal in production of electricity is freeing more natural gas. A major pitfall cited by the Congressman in use of this coal is however, "the exorbitant freight rates" charged by railroads to transport the oil; and the high severance taxes being imposed by western states. "An unfair return to the railroad companies is unfair to the consumers," he said, adding that the high severance taxes "are unacceptable and clearly a case of gouging."
