Homemakers' Reflections

"Double Batching"

Shoulder pads emphasize fashionable width in the shoulder area. This look will continue during fall/winter '79. Make or buy shoulder pads in different sizes and thickness. The trick comes in adjusting pads to the proper size and thickness for the figure type (loping or square shoulders) and the amount allowed by the pattern or garment designer. More thickness is needed at the end of the shoulder at the armhole if extra diagonal folds form along the underarm area above the bustline toward the neckline. Sleeves will not hang properly. Correct this problem by raising the garment at the end of the shoulder until the garment lies smoothly. A thicker shoulder pad is needed. Less thickness is needed if pull or wrinkle lines form from the end of the shoulder toward the center front and back. Again, sleeves will not hang properly. To make the garment lie smoothly, lower the end of the shoulder. A thinner shoulder pad is needed. Experiment with existing loose-fitting garments to see if shoulder pads can be successfully added. When sewing patterns that do not allow for shoulder pads, alter the pattern for square shoulder to add pads. Add length at the outside of the shoulder for both front and back pattern pieces.

ASCS List 1979 Payment Limitations

The County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office advises that under the 1979 farm act the payment for wheat, feed grains, and cotton is limited to \$45,000.00 for deficiency and diversion payments "per person" on all farms. Rice is limited at \$50,000.00.

1979 Rice Loan and Purchase Rates are as follows: Long Grain, \$12.18 per cwt.; Medium and Short Grain, 10.45 per cwt.; Broken, 4.40 per cwt. The 1979 loan interest rate has been set at 9 percent for all commodities by C.C.C.

Set-aside Average

Be sure set-aside acreage under the program is not grazed until Oct. 1, 1979, and no harvesting through December 1979. See that erosion, weeds, and shrubs are controlled. This office will monitor set-aside checks, said County ASCS executive director Daniel C. Strechfus.

For program purposes keep all production records separate and identified by crop year and farm number. The programs require this information for proven and low yield application.

Disaster Benefits

Eligible producers with failed acreage of program commodities which will not be harvested should contact the ASCS office and request an appraisal within 15 days after the crop is abandoned or before other use is made of the crop. "If you suspect low yield of a crop for reasons beyond your control contact this office while evidence of the crop is still apparent and within 15 days after the harvest. In both of the above cases a disaster form ASCS 574 must be signed at this office, and field inspection made by an employee of the C.O.C., added Strechfus.

Fans in Winter
