Mahalite Home Heavily Damaged While Answering Ambulance Call

John and June Mahalite, Jr. received heavy fire, smoke and water damage to their home at 411 Gwynn Street in Eagle Lake on Tuesday night of last week as the result of a fire which started in the kitchen of the home while Mrs. Mahalite was on an emergency call with the Eagle Lake Ambulance Corps.

June and John are two of the Eagle Lake Ambulance Corps' most active members. She had been on call all day last Tuesday and he was scheduled for duty Tuesday night but had not returned home from his farming operations in the Matthews area. June was covering for him and was in the process of preparing supper when an emergency call came in from the ambulance corps from the Edgar Atkins home, several blocks from the Mahalite home. Mrs. Mahalite said the batteries in her pager were going bad and she did not hear the call but heard the ambulance siren sounding on State Street en route to the Atkins home. She made a quick phone call to find out where the emergency was

and then departed in haste to be of assistance, forgetting about a skillet of grease on the stove.

"The first thing I usually do when the pager sounds an emergency is to be sure all stove burners are off, but because of the faulty batteries in the pager and the nearness of the emergency, I forgot to do my regular routine," she reflected sadly.

A half hour or so later, after assisting at the hospital with efforts to stabilize Mr. Atkins, who had suffered a heart attack, so that he might be taken to Houston by Life Flight helicopter, she remembered that she might have left a burner on on her kitchen range. June called a neighbor to check the home. She found the home filled with smoke and fire and immediately called the volunteer fire department at 9 p.m.

Firemen were able to extinguish the blaze, primarily concentrated in the kitchen area, but the entire home was filled with smoke and fire. There was extensive damage throughout the home from the heat, smoke and water.

Assistant Fire Chief T. J. Smith said that the fire had come in a minute or two later, the fire probably would have gotten to the attic and the roof and the entire house and belongings may have been destroyed.

Mr. Mahalite was still at his farm at the time of the fire and had to be notified of the tragedy at his home. The Mahalites' son, Clay, had left the weekend before for Dallas where he will be attending a technical institute, so no one was at home at the time of the fire to hear the alarms being sounded by smoke and fire detector units in the home. A neighbor reported hearing the alarms but wasn't sure what they were.

John and June will be residing in the Monroe County garage apartment on Cat Spring Road until extensive repairs, which will be required to make the home livable again, are made.

Citizens in the area express regret at the loss suffered by these two persons who have dedicated so much time in caring for the needs of others.

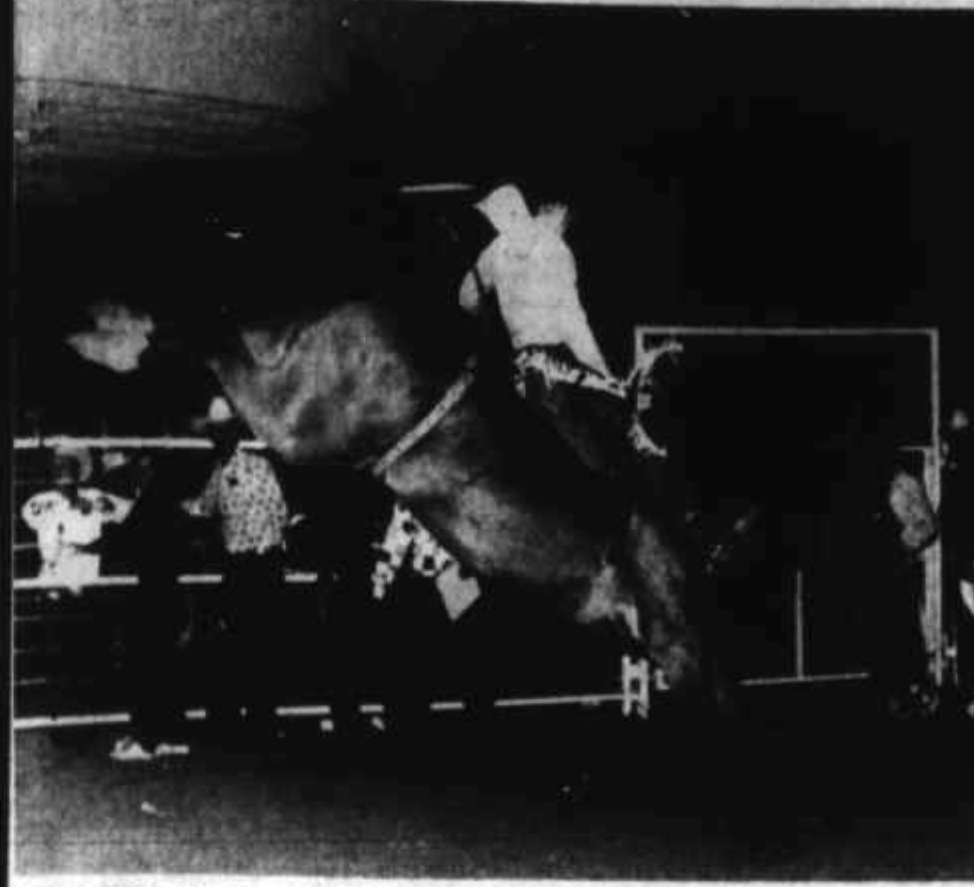
