Be 'Energy Smart'
If that isn't possible, ask for an estimate of energy amounts used and cost. Ask about the energy-use habits of family members and the appliances in the home, especially those that will stay with the house. Also ask about any energy-saving features of the home, such as insulation, caulking, window types, heating and cooling features, and any others that may exist. Also notice window exposures — west-facing windows need special protection from afternoon sun in the summer.

Pre-Depression Depression
This today can't be like it was in 1927-28-29 even though everybody is working on his second million today as they were then. Those of you old enough remember that President Hoover was promising two cars in every garage and a chicken in everybody. Hoover would be glad if he came back today: (1) Roosevelt is dead; (2) there are two or more cars in every garage (all imported); and (3) there's a chicken in every pot—made out of soybeans. Back then it was believed that a presidential candidate had to have only one wife, be a family man. He had to believe in home and family enough to practice. Today at least one presidential candidate hasn't practiced marriage, but he does believe in taking his wife friend to Africa. He's a wildlife lover, they say. Just like today, there was no thought for tomorrow, back then in 1929. Everybody bought on the installment plan; now we use credit cards. It was said that those who didn't have jobs just didn't want to work. That was just about everybody wasn't working. One of the bestsellers in the '30s was called "60 Families." Some author proved that 60 families had most of the money in America—and it was kept under cover. Soybean Field Day At Beaumont Sept. 5
Special emphasis will be on development, varietal improvement and disease control during the annual Soybean Field Day set for Sept. 5 at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center near Beaumont. "Field day attractions also are expected to be tours of research plots and discussions concerning research progress. Live insects will be displayed for identification and information on control will be provided," said Dr. J. P. Craigsmiles, resident director for research at the A&M Center. Special equipment for soybean production and harvest will be displayed and discussed. Kicking off field day activities will be registration and a continental breakfast from 8 to 9 a.m. Tours of research plots will begin promptly at 9 o'clock. After the tours, field day groups will assemble in the A&M Center's main auditorium at 11 a.m. for a talk by Allen Avers, president-elect of the American Soybean Association and a soybean producer from Kirkland, Ill. His keynote address will be on "Soybean Outlook."

Proper Management Of Land Helps Wildlife

Did you know that deer require a diet of about 10% protein in order for the bucks to grow and develop a large and healthy set of horns, or a doe to develop and have a healthy fawn? Yes, this is a true fact. Grasses such as the native and improved grasses in Colorado County will not furnish this kind of protein. They only furnish about 8-10% protein, so a deer has to find other sources of food to meet its dietary needs. In order to meet these needs, the deer browses on forbs and shrubs which produce the needed protein requirement. Plants such as American Beautyberry, Yucca, Greenbrier, Vetch, Hackberry, and Honeyuckle furnish the needed protein for deer. Now, the eating habit of a deer is very unique since the deer gingerly picks at his food source, and only nips the end of a leaf of the plant from which it is eating. It is very important to manage lands which furnish habitat for deer, so that the plants from which the deer gets its protein needs are not overgrazed by cattle or other livestock. Many times a competitive grazing situation occurs on grazing lands, and the deer come out the loser as a result of cattle overgrazing the deer browse and plants. When this happens, the deer either die from starvation, or have to move to new areas which can furnish the plants for their needed diet. A proper balance is needed between cattle, deer, and the forage available for both cattle and deer. To meet this balance, approximately 15 to 20 acres of brush, grass and browse are needed for each head of livestock and deer grazing in the area. This is a rule of thumb figure, and may vary slightly depending on the forage growing conditions for that particular year. Doves and quail on the other hand, require different habitat than that of deer. The primary food sources for doves and quail are plants which produce seed such as ragweed, croton, sunflower, vetch, and grass seeds. These seeds meet the dietary needs of the quail and doves. If a landowner is interested in producing these types of seeds, he can either disc up an area, and let the weeds grow for a seed source for the doves and quail or he can plant the needed seeds for the doves and quail needs. Doves require a source of water to supply their daily needs, but quail have the ability to remove water from the seeds they eat, and can get by without requiring a drink of water every day. Quail can also get their needed water requirements from dew on grass early of a morning. Management of land for wildlife purposes is as important as management of land for any other purpose. You will need to provide the proper habitat and environment for the deer, dove or quail on your particular place. So to produce quality wildlife, proper wildlife management must be practiced at all times.
