Notes For Mail-Order Shopping

With gasoline prices on the rise, many consumers may turn to mail-order shopping as a way to save time and money.

However, past experiences with mail-order shopping have left many consumers dissatisfied.

The Attorney General's Office and other consumer complaint handling agencies report that mail-order problems are among the most frequently reported of all.

To avoid consumer problems, take these precautions:

- 1) Learn to spot an exaggeration. The small type often qualifies the big, bold headline.
- 2) When ordering, be specific. Give a written description, the correct order number and price, and indicate if you would accept a substitute, and if so, what it is.
- 3) Don't send cash. Pay only by check or money order and include shipping and handling charges.
- 4) Write a complete description of the item, as well as the address of the company, on your check so that when the canceled check is returned, you will have all the information at your finger tips.

Brown Rice With Cheese
2 tablespoons ghee or butter
1 1/2 cups chopped scallions
2 1/2 cups brown rice
6 1/4 cups chicken stock or water and chicken bouillon cubes
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon freshly cracked pepper
1 lb. Swiss cheese, sliced or cubed
1 1/2 cups grated cheese
Cooking time: 1 1/2 hours; Serves 6.

Heat the ghee and oil in a pan. Gently fry the scallions (green leaves included) until soft and golden. Add the washed and well-drained rice and fry, stirring continuously, for about 5 minutes. Add the hot stock, salt, and pepper. Stir, cover and simmer for 1 hour. Turn into a buttered ovenproof dish.

Cover the top of the rice with slices of Swiss cheese, or with a grated cheese, and place under a hot broiler, or in a 425 degree oven until the cheese melts and turns golden. Garnish with parsley sprigs, and serve hot.

Fertilizer With Herbicide Poses Problem

Within recent weeks this office has received several telephone calls from homeowners inquiring about what may be causing their trees to die in their dooryard landscape. The symptoms described were those of herbicide damage of the type caused by the hormone type such as 2,4-D. I have visited some of these locations and in discussing with the homeowners I have discovered that they have been using a fertilizer that contained a weed killer in their fertilizing program. This had caused a chronic condition among many of the trees on their property. In some instances dead trees had already been removed and in all likelihood will have to remove more trees that the herbicide had

killed.

Characteristics exhibited by trees that have been damaged by lawn applied herbicide are: abnormal leaf shape and size, profligate growth along the branches on the interior of the tree where leaves do not normally grow, an increase in suckering along branches and the main body of the tree and also around the base of the tree, and generally high leaf drop in advanced stages of poisoning.

In order to help the situation, about the only recommendation that we could make is to insure that the soil has plenty of water applied during periods when it is not raining in an attempt to flush the herbicides down into the lower layers, out of the root zone. This practice will not guarantee results, however, as many trees may be too far gone to revive.

ASC Executive Director Streckfuss Speaks To Rotary

Daniel C. Streckfuss, executive director of the Colorado County Office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in Columbus was the guest speaker at the meeting of the Eagle Lake Rotary Club on Wednesday last week and he brought information on operation of the office and on programs which are available through the ASCS office.

Frank Cullen was program chairman for the day and introduced the speaker.

Streckfuss told the Rotarians and guests that the ASCS programs in this county are governed by a three-member committee comprised of Milton Beken of Weimar, Chairman; Louis Crane of Garwood, Vice Chairman; and Henry Sunderman of Eagle Lake, Member. The three-year term of Sunderman expires this year and he is eligible for reelection for a third year term since ASCS regulations limit the number of terms in office to three.

Streckfuss told the gathering of the use of the Normal Cropland Acreage (NCA) base for determining eligibility for ASCS programs; the benefits derived by agricultural producers from participation in the programs.

He noted that Colorado County with its 46,937.6 acreage allotment for the 1979 rice crop, ranks third in the state. (A total of 21 counties in the state have rice production.)

He also pointed out that peanuts are the only crop still under the marketing quota program and this county has 52 peanut farms with a total of 900 acres, mostly in the Meats and Bernards areas.

Colorado County received an allocation of \$96,000 for ASCS programs, said the director. "Under these programs, approved by the three-member committee, the federal government pays for 50% of the costs." He added that the county office received \$90,000 for administration of the office for the year of 1979.

Streckfuss noted the impact of the programs on the economy of this county by stating that in 1978 the county ASCS office paid out \$1,624,000 in rice deficiency payments, based on a 78c per pound weight deficiency in the target price program. Also the county office paid out \$34,208 in deficiency payments to other grain farmers on their 1978 crops.

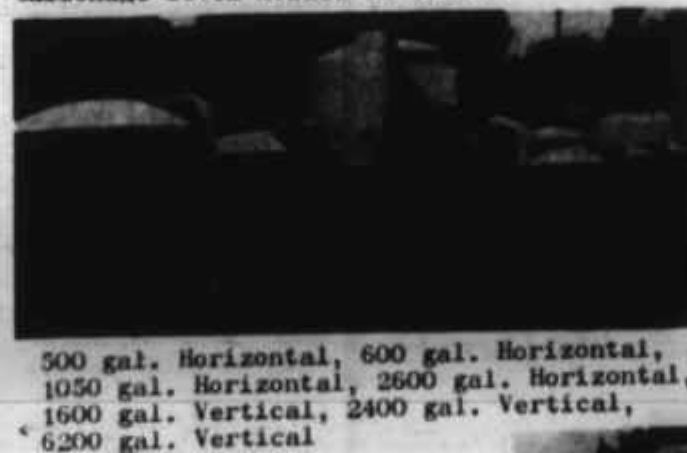
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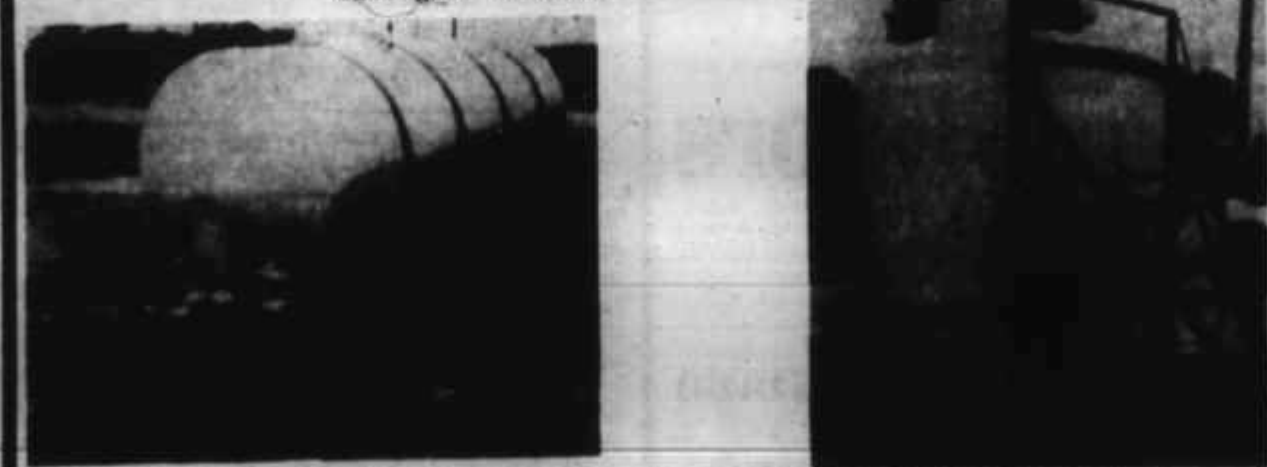
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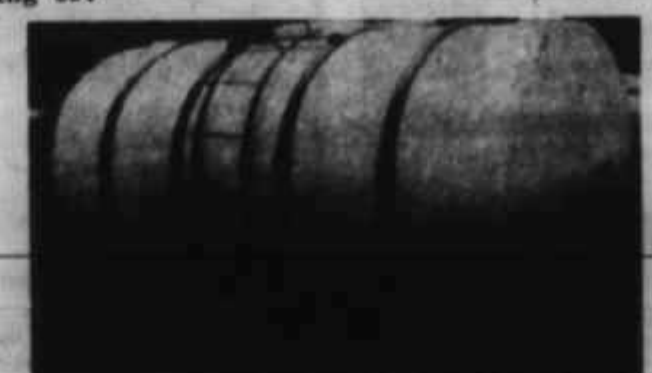
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St. Jude Bike-a-thon Cyclists
