Garwood-Sheridan Raiders Get First Dist. Win 18-14

Go To Flatonia Thursday at 5:00

The Garwood and Sheridan football teams won their district contest at Schulenburg, 18-14, Thursday evening of last week, bringing the Raiders' season record to one win and two losses and the district record even at one win and one loss.

The Raiders jumped off to a 12 to 0 first half lead and added a touchdown in the fourth period to pull the game out of the fire.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Raiders sustained a 60-yard drive early in the second quarter with Mark Munoz scoring from the 15 yard line to go out 12-0.

The Raiders rallied in the fourth quarter with one more good drive that went 60 yards to pay dirt with quarterback Pratt sneaking over from the one to put the Raiders back out front 18-14.

For the third time the try for the extra points failed, but the game ended shortly thereafter with the first district win of the season in hand for the Raiders.

Munoz led the Raider ball carriers with a total of 75 yards and tailback Kenny Johnson added 72. Pratt completed 2 of 7 passes for 25 yards.

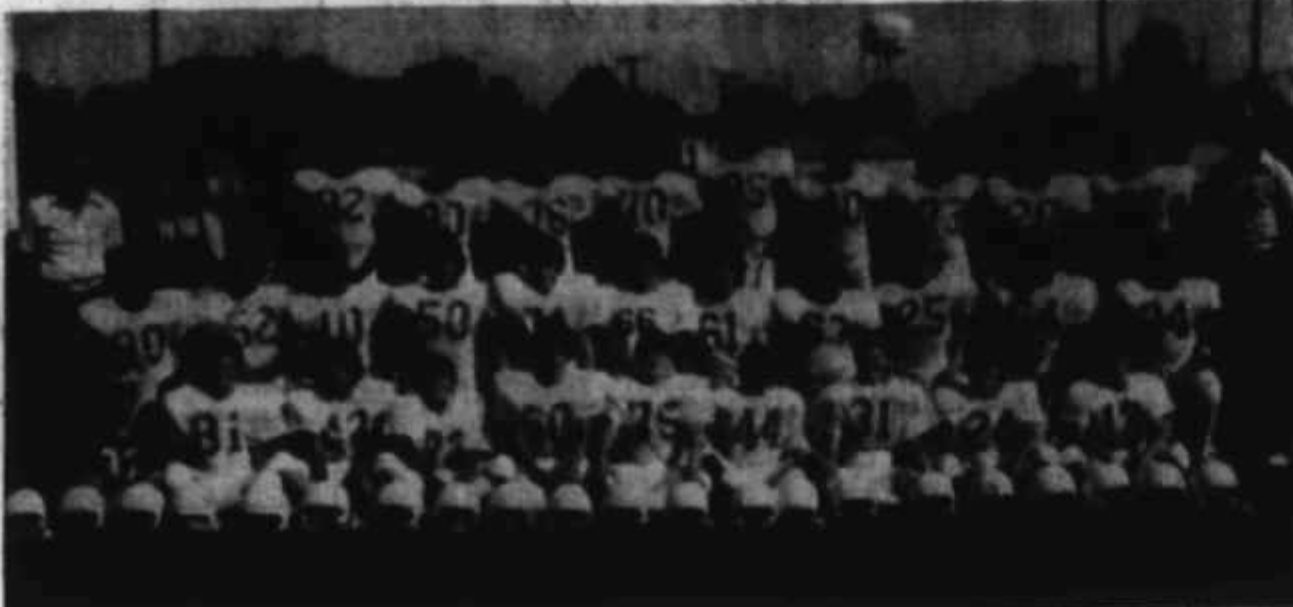
The KC team from Eagle Lake is leading the Moonlighters League at the Sealy Bowling Palace with a total of 13 wins at the end of play

County Judge Proclaims 4-H Week

Lois Mills, H.H. Administrator Is Honored

Lois Mills, administrator of Heritage House in Eagle Lake, has been awarded National Living Centers 4-H Administrator of the Year Award, the company's highest recognition of individual achievement. The presentation was made by Demeis Smith, President of National Living Centers, at the annual Administrator's Workshop in Austin.

This annual award is presented to a select few of National Living Centers 166 volunteer home administrators. To be eligible for the award, an administrator must be employed by National Living Centers for a full year and demonstrate exceptional ability in their profession. The award recognizes achievement in nursing care, facility operations, and personnel management and is a token of National Living Centers appreciation for their dedication, time, and efforts on behalf of their residents.

CPL Rate Request
Judge Cranek read to the court a notice from Central Power and Light Co. stating that the company has filed with the Public Utilities Commission for a rate increase and that Nov. 15th is the deadline for protests of such increase to rural customers as well as to those in incorporated cities.

Tax Levy Set For CO's
In the morning session, when all members of the court were present, the court approved a tax levy for retirement of the \$630,000 in certificates of obligation to be issued to cover costs of the courthouse renovation program. The legal action by the court called for the levying of a tax rate sufficient to retire the certificates of obligation over a ten year period, plus a 2% reserve. It is anticipated

that revenue for the program will come from the 10c per \$100 valuation authorized by the court in the county's 6c ad valorem tax for court-house renovation and jail improvements.

The action on the tax levy passed by a 4-1 vote, with Precinct 4 Commissioner Bill Stiles voting against. Judge Lester Cranek, Commissioner Otto Leonard, Rafael Yanez and Crockett Leyendecker voted for.

In other action the court approved a request from Commissioner Stiles that Precinct 4 employees be placed on a seniority step pay schedule or step program.

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Tigers Too Powerful For Raiders, Win By 27-6

Raiders Look For First Dist. Win Friday vs. Hempstead In Altair

The Rice High School Raiders football team found the state Class AA defending champion and Area No. 1 Class AA team, the Sealy Tigers, a bit too talented in Sealy last Friday night. The Raiders lost to the Sealy 27 to 6 in the District 20AA opener for both teams.

The Raiders turned in some good play after recuperating from the loss of a number of regulars who discontinued football after the last non-district game, and demonstrated a good defense and an offense that seemed to have potential but never really got rolling.

The Tigers took the opening kickoff drive and marched 83 yards in three first downs, mostly on the talented running of Ebony Cobb, before quarterback Bobby Browne sneaked over from the one. Browne kicked the extra point to give the Sealy 6-0 lead with 7:57 left in the first quarter.

Step 2 Sealy Drives
The Raiders stifled another Tiger drive with some good defense sparked by Lester Pettus, Robert Turner and John Schneider on the Rice 27 yard line in the first quarter. They stopped another Sealy drive, with some good support from Andy Morales, Tim Wood, Randy Epps and others on the Rice 16. Still Sealy drove and scored a 14-0 lead with 7:57 left in the first quarter.

After the Raiders were unable to move, Schneider got off a booming rolling punt that went 32 yards to the Sealy 12 with 4:24 left in the second period and it appeared the half would end 7-0. But just as lightning strikes quickly, so did the Tigers when Browne passed to split end Ricky Cloud and he eluded one possible tackler and went 48 yards for the score. A run by Browne for two extra points failed and Sealy led 13 to 0 late in the second period.

Raiders Attempt Field Goal
Sealy got off a short kick after the TD and Rice got good field position at the Rice 47. A personal foul penalty against the Raiders set up a first down on the Sealy 32. Quarterback Kenny Hyeik split end Robert Barrios for 12 yards and a first down on the 20. A fifteen yard holding penalty hurt the Raiders' chance to score, although a Hyeik to Cook pass got 10 of the yards back. On fourth down, sophomore James Rhodes was called on to attempt a 48 yard field goal but the kick was short and to the right and Sealy ran one play before the half ended 13 to 0, and even at that point, victory for the Raiders didn't seem out of sight.

Good Halftime Show
The Rice Riders band turned in an excellent performance at halftime and drew loud applause with their rendition of "Eumbeachero" as the twirlers performed before the Sealy crowd.

The Tigers and their band also performed well and crowned a homecoming queen as a climax to their show.

The Raiders got a bad break when a short kickoff to the second half was short and Sealy recovered on the Rice 37. It only took Cobb and Browne and company seven plays to get to the five and Cobb scored on a 100 yard run. Sealy led 21 to 0. On the extra point run, one of the Raiders' key offensive and defensive players, John Schneider received a blow under the chin and he never returned to action in the game and his services were missed.

However, sophomore Kenneth Hemphill stepped in to fill his shoes and demonstrated some hard running. Also another sophomore, John Dawson, pulled up with Hemphill from the JV to fill vacancies left by the departure of some Raiders last week, turned in good play of rebounds of punts and

After the third TD, Jeff Darden almost broke over and rammed 19 yards on

a good run to the Sealy 44. Frazier got the ball back for the Raiders later by recovering a lateral pass on the Sealy 26. Hemphill gained 5 in two tries and Hyeik Barrios for 2 to 18. Hemphill got a first down for the Raiders on the 15 but the Raiders failed to connect on two passes and gave the ball up on the Sealy 15.

Punt Returns Set Up TD
Frazier got the ball back for the Raiders later by recovering a lateral pass on the Sealy 26. Hemphill gained 5 in two tries and Hyeik Barrios for 2 to 18. Hemphill got a first down for the Raiders on the 15 but the Raiders failed to connect on two passes and gave the ball up on the Sealy 15.

A stubborn Rice defense with some good tackles by John Chisholm, Danny and Epps forced the Sealy 47 punt. Barrios grabbed the ball just as it was about to come to a stop on the Rice 48 and scooted down the sideline for 39 yards to the Sealy 12 before being knocked out of bounds. Darden gained 3, Hemphill 6 and Hyeik got the first down on the one foot line with center Michael Faichtinger and guards Andy Morales and Tony Gonzalez leading the way. From that point Darden went in for the score to cut the lead to 27 to 6 with 1:51 left to play. Hemphill tried a halfback pass to Barrios for the extra points, but it was knocked down. After the kickoff Sealy was forced to punt and Rice got another chance but a long pass was intercepted by Jackie Wallace and the game

ended on the following play at 27 to 6.

Others turning in good play for the Raiders on offense were tackles Rhodes and Mike Rios, and on defense Barrios and Darden at ends.

Statistics Favor Sealy
Statistically the Tigers were way ahead in every department except in punts. Rice rushed for 109 yards and completed 3 of 16 passes for 24 yards and had two interceptions for a 132 yard total for the night. They punted 3 times for an average of 45 yards and had one blocked; drew 4 penalties for 50 yards; had 5 fumbles and lost two of them made eight first downs and gave the ball up on downs three times. The Tigers meanwhile rambled for 266 yards on the ground with Cobb accounting for 121 in 17 carries and passed 19 times with eight completions for 140 yards (4 were caught by Cloud for 99 yards), for a total of 406 yards for the night. They gained 3 punts for 60 yards and had 12 penalties for 132 yards, fumbled six times and lost two. The Tigers had 19 first downs and gave the ball up twice on downs.

This Friday night, at 7:30 p.m. Coach Mike Rice's Raiders will be seeking their first district win when they entertain the Hempstead Bobcats in Raider stadium.

The Raiders will enter the contest with a one win, three loss record while the Bobcats are 0-4 after losing last week to Waller.

The Raider team, coaches, Outriders pep units, Raider band and student body urged you to come out to support the Raiders Friday night in their endeavor to break into the win column against the Hempstead Bobcats.

Rice Freshmen Stay Unbeaten With Victory Over Sealy 21-0

The Rice High School Freshmen Raiders picked up their third win of the season against no losses last Thursday night as they defeated Sealy 21 to 0 in the first game of the District 20AA competition at Raider Stadium.

From there, Corman hit end Ronnie Cook with a pass and Cook, with the help of a key block from Bittner, darted to the end zone for the final Raider touchdown of the night.
