Retail vs. Trade Prices

Cattlemen and consumer have one major point in common - they can't understand why a steer at the feedlot brings only 95¢/cwt. when a steer at the market costs \$2.50/lb. To most people, this difference seems suspiciously high. But is it?

A 1,000 lb. Choice steer actually yields only about a 600 lb. carcass. All the remainder, about 400 lb., is by-products, some of which have value such as hides, tallow, etc. and the rest is valueless. Unfortunately, even that 600 lb. carcass is not all steaks and roasts. The average Choice beef carcass yields only about 25% steaks, 24% roasts and 24% miscellaneous cuts such as hamburger, short ribs and stew meat. Nearly 27% of the carcass is left in bone, fat trimmings, shrinkage, cutting loss and waste. It, therefore, takes about 2.25 pounds of a live Choice grade steer to yield one pound of saleable beef in a retail store.

Demand Differs
Further complicating the pricing system, all beef cuts are not equally demanded. Those that do have a high demand are usually only a small proportion of the carcass. A retailer, therefore, must put a high enough price on those strongly demanded cuts to make up for the loss on the cuts that must be sold below cost. For example, that 600 lb. carcass would provide only about 50 pounds of sirloin steaks, 37 pounds of rib roasts, and 66 pounds of round steaks. In contrast, we would get 166 pounds of hamburger, stew meat, and miscellaneous cuts. The waste or cutting loss would amount to 182 pounds.

Using our earlier figures of 95¢/cwt. for the live steer means that the average cost of all the retail cuts for the carcass would have to be \$1.56/lb. - just to pay for the animal and not including any costs of slaughtering, wholesale, cutting, wrapping.

USDA Asks Comments On '80 Peanut Crop

The public has until November 15 to make recommendations for the 1980-Crop Peanut Program. Ray Fitzgerald, Administrator of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said.

Consideration will be given to written comments on the following:
-the amount of the national acreage allotment;
-the amount of the national production quota; and
-the apportionment of such allotment to states.
The Secretary of Agriculture is required to announce by December 1 a 1980 national acreage allotment of not less than 1,516,000 acres and a 1980 national production quota of not less than 1,516,000 short tons (3,032 million pounds). The national production quota will establish the quantity of 1980-crop peanuts eligible for loan at the domestic edible support rate.

The Secretary may increase the quota if for any marketing year he determines estimated requirements for domestic edible use and a reasonable carryover.
