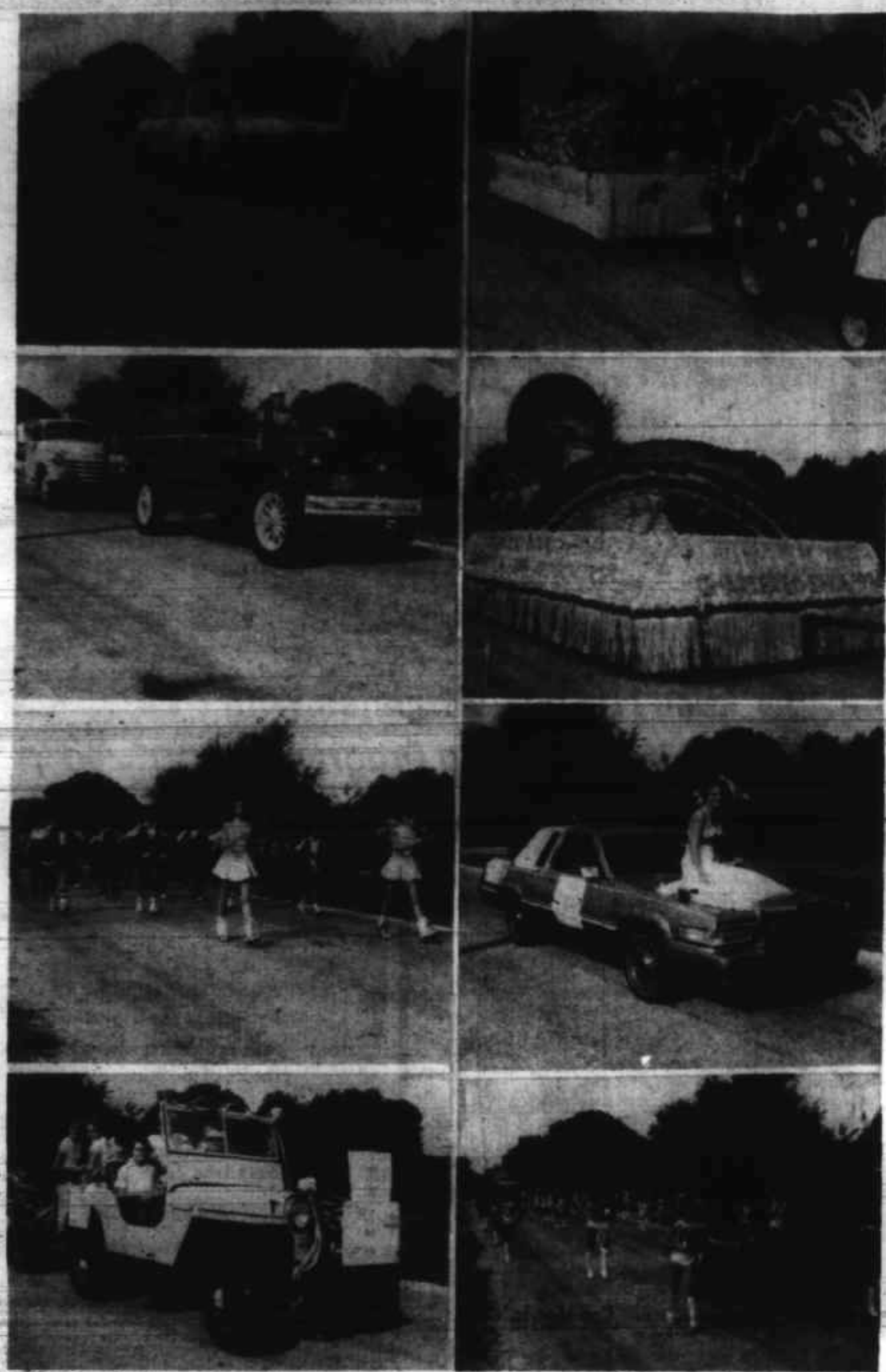


Scenes From Garwood Lions Parade

Allens Creek Project Major Concern Of Houston L&P

Houston Lighting and Power Company regards the development of the Allens Creek Nuclear Generating Station as a high priority matter despite licensing impediments, members of the Sealy Rotary Club were told Oct. 12th. Graham Painter, public relations manager for the Light Company, briefed club members on the licensing status of the plant before the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, the Federal agency which must authorize

its design before construction can begin. As integral part of the Light Company's shift away from natural gas toward the more abundant fuels, coal and uranium, Painter said. The nuclear plant will contribute the electrical equivalent of approximately 12 million barrels of oil to local electrical needs each year, so will play a significant role in H&P's program to diversify its fuel

Knebl's entry had a crude protein of 13.6%. The grand champion entry in the annual grass division was a 20% crude protein ryegrass entry by Frank Koles, Jr. of Weimar.

Knebl and Koles were presented engraved plaques courtesy of Heffley's Mill and Columbus Agri. Center in recognition of their accomplishments.

Perennial division class winners were as follows: Bermuda's - Nick Knebl, Blumens - Robert Jasek of Lone Oak, and Mixed Perennial Grasses - Edgar Helms of Frelsburg.

Annual grass division class winners were: Johnson grass - Charles T. Treffry, Jr. of Weimar; Sorghum/Sudax crosses - Martin Herms of Eagle Lake, Ryegrass and Oats - Frank Koles, Jr. of Weimar; and other annual grasses - Jerome Wicks of Bernard.

Class winners were presented certificates for fertilizer from MG, Inc. Bumper Crop - Inc. New Blumens Farmers Co-Op, H&B Grocery, and Moller Feed Mill.

The show entries were judged as follows: 28 blue, 41 red, and 23 white ribbon entries.
