Mrs. Mark Lueder/Wied was chairman of the Domestic Exhibit competition. The Texas Nursing Home Association was established in 1964 and at present consists of 1021 member nursing homes which represent 103,072 licensed beds. Mrs. Barten has been administrator of Autumn Hills since 1976 and Mrs. Schaff has been administrator of Sweetbriar since July after transferring here from Green Acres in Houstville. Local Library Qualifies For Region Assistance. Fifty-two libraries including the Eula and David Winterman Library of Eagle Lake in the 26-county area served by the Houston Area Library System have qualified for membership in the regional public library system organized under provisions of the Texas Library Systems Act of 1969 administered by the Texas State Library. As members of the system, they will be able to take advantage of cooperative programs to improve library service made possible by this legislation.

The system will receive a grant of \$880,337 for services in the area where one of every four Texans live. These services will provide technical assistance for libraries and will extend the range of materials available to library users. The system office will produce bibliographies, handbooks and other materials requested by member libraries and will conduct workshops.

Cong. Pickle Discusses Pol. Action. (By Cong. J. J. Pickle) For many years, there have been organizations called Political Action Committees or PAC's. These PAC's have basically one purpose—to give donations to people running for public office. The PAC gets its money from individuals who belong to the group that controls the PAC. The group can be members of a labor union, trade association, professional group, employees of a corporation, or people united to push a single issue or philosophy.

This past week, the House voted to limit the amount that a single PAC could contribute to one candidate in one year to \$9,000, if there are three elections—primary, run-off, and general. This works out to \$3,000 per election. The previous limit was \$5,000 per election. The House action also limits the amount of money that a candidate can receive from all PAC's to \$70,000. The House vote was 217 to 198. I did not vote to place these limits on PAC's. First, I felt like these limitations raise serious Constitutional

questions. The Supreme Court has held on numerous occasions that when people join together to support a man or woman for political office, it is an expression of their First Amendment right of freedom of speech. Giving money is considered an expression of opinion. But the main reason for my vote was that I feel that it is too soon to make a firm conclusion on PAC's influence in elections. Proponents of the limit claimed PAC's give an advantage to challengers. I am not convinced of this.
