The recipients, about 4,500 people, are all seapersons who will be on the high seas on Christmas Day, and will have little else in the way of celebration.

Houston International Seamen's Center is an international effort, long in existence, to minister to sailors coming into the Port of Houston. Although its work may possibly be known vaguely by many people through their own churches, Chaplain Scott's program on November 13 will be a fine opportunity to learn more about this effective and far-reaching Christian ministry.

MANY SPECIAL BLESSINGS slip into the life of a farm wife. These unexpected moments leave me with a special feeling of closeness to the Creator. I experienced this holy awareness the day the geese landed.

It began as a very ordinary, late Indian summer day on the farm. Leaves were crunching underfoot. The morning chill crept into my bones, but by afternoon it was another beautiful autumn day.

Time for Thinking
As a farm wife, I was helping my husband in the field. I was discing ahead of his tractor and plow as he plowed the stubble under for winter. As our tractors wove back and forth across the field, I did my usual meditating. This is a regular custom with me.

Out in the open fields, I always sense a special relationship with God, our landlord. While there have been lean, hard years of farming, so have there been bounteous ones. With this special partnership, we have never really lacked any of the necessities of life. Despite this, sometimes we have forgotten the blessings of the "good life."

As I raised my eyes to the beautiful skies and breathed in the clean, pure air, I gasped at the sight

which met my eyes. With a shower of fluttering wings, hundreds of blue and Canadian snow geese settled down to rest and feed in the field I was discing.

Although I always watch the spring and fall skies for these majestic birds, this was a first-time experience seeing them so close. Their long, graceful necks and heads bobbed about as they gleaned the ground of leftover grain. All the while, their noisy chorus kept them in touch as they ate. It could even be heard above the roar of my tractor.

I will never forget the awe I felt as I disced back and forth, not 50 feet from them. For over 2 hours they fed and rested, all the while watching me curiously as I worked. Each time I made a round, they carefully kept their distance from my machine—never flying, but moving just a bit farther away where they felt safer.

Listened to Chit-Chat
On my final time across the field, I throttled the tractor down so I could hear their noisy chit-chat better. A single backfire from the motor ended the visit in a hurry. With a mighty whirr of a thousand wings, they soared off into the heavens, lost against a beautiful sunset.

How can one who tills the soil and lives with nature, take such beautiful moments for granted? They come as special blessings with perhaps a message of God. To all things there is a season: A time to heed the heavenly plans.

So the geese each year know just when and where to go. It is no accident—but a blessing to enjoy. I know I will never forget the feeling in my own heart the day the geese landed.
