A lengthy business session was held in which the year's work was planned.

Time To Move Plants
Mrs. Zoeller, a horticulture chairman, gave a most interesting discussion. In it she gave instructions for moving plants to a new location since now is a good time for such. Plants are becoming dormant and the weather is cool. She recommended digging the new hole first, filling it with the soil from the old hole, and then placing the plant in the new hole. The bottom and sides of the new hole until it will accommodate the plant to be moved. Carefully dig up the plant, leaving as much soil on it as possible. Place it in the new hole making sure it is planted the exact height it was while growing. Fill it with soil and water it until the water runs out the hole. Water the plant every day for seven days.

Try saving your Caladium bulbs by removing them from the soil when the leaves begin to die, added Mrs. Zoeller. Cut the foliage off and store the bulbs in a cool, ventilated place. An old stocking is good for holding the bulbs, and may be hung in the garage.

Another suggested method is storing the bulbs in dry sand and placing them in a cool place. When very cold weather is forecast, water well, for cold kills dry roots faster than soaked ones.

Mrs. Havens showed films of the 1979 Autumn in New England which portrayed beautiful fall foliage and interesting places which she and Mrs. Newlander saw on a recent tour.

tated the increase, say Cable TV officials. "We are constructing a new 24-hour-a-day channel from Atlanta, Georgia. The new station will take the place of the local time and weather on channel 4, which will be combined with the national weather service station on channel 6, they added.

The new station is an example of our efforts to bring the best possible service to our customers in Eagle Lake," said Richard Thiesen of Communication Services, Inc.

Truck Parking
Richard Simmons, owner of a tire repair and auto service business on West A Street, approached the council about "rumors of a squeeze on truck parking on city streets."

According to Simmons, gravel truck drivers had been informed by their safety officers not to park on the street of his business because the city was going to issue tickets.

Simmons added that he had found parking for the trucks next to his building and that sometimes trucks park on the street but only for short periods of time. He insisted that the trucks did not block the road and that parking along West A was not hampered.

He did indicate that any ordinance denying parking in the city would severely hamper his business since the rumor of such action had already effected it somewhat.

The councilmen, unaware of that particular problem, told Simmons that there would be no problem as long as passage along the street was clear. The council is expected to discuss the problem with Mayor Straus and clear the situation at the next meeting.

The council also approved a request by the local VFW Post for the closing of Main Street in front of the Municipal Building from 2 to 4 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 11th for Veterans' Day ceremonies to be held on that date.

3 Die, 1 Hurt In IH-10 Crash

A two-car crash on IH-10 at Seely Friday afternoon, Oct. 19th claimed the lives of three university students and sent a fourth person to the hospital. The three, all of Houston, were riding in a late model sports car which was involved in the two-car, head-on collision, according to a report by Texas Department of Public Safety Officer John Janick who was the investigating officer.

The three victims bring the traffic death toll for the year to ten.

Killed in the accident were James Richard McCrosky, 19, a student at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos, Jennifer Ann Sauer, 18, a student at Southwest Texas State University at Georgetown, and Susan Dennis, 19. All were riding in the 1979 Porsche driven by McCrosky.

The driver of the other car, a 1978 Cadillac, Sheikh Elvi Abdaji, 42, of San Diego, California, was last reported in stable condition at the John Seely Hospital in Galveston.

According to the DPS report, McCrosky was traveling eastbound on IH-10 at about 3:30 p.m. on Friday, October 19, when he swerved quickly to the left to avoid a slow-moving vehicle ahead of him. He apparently lost control of his car which skidded across the median and into the path of the westbound car driven by Abdaji, Belleville Times.
