Order In The Classroom

Part IV
The following article is the fourth section of "Order in the Classroom." The previous three sections have been printed in earlier editions of the paper.

Last week's printing dealt with Mr. Postman's own attitudes toward education today. And now he will continue to express his own feelings about the subject of what is wrong with our educational system and the steps that can be taken to improve it.

It is worth saying that the modern conception of childhood is a product of the sixteenth century, as Philippe Ariès has documented in his "Centuries of Childhood." Prior to that century, children as young as six and seven were treated in all important respects as if they were adults. Their language, their dress, their legal status, their responsibilities, their labor, were much the same as those of adults. The concept of childhood as an identifiable stage in human growth began to develop in the sixteenth century and has continued into our own times. However, with the emergence of electronic media of communication, a reversal of this trend seems to be taking place. In a culture in which the distribution of information is almost wholly undifferentiated, age categories begin to disappear. Television, in itself, may bring an end to childhood. In truth, there is no such thing as "children's programming," at least not for children over the age of eight or nine. Everyone sees and hears the same things. We have already reached a point where crimes of youth are indistinguishable from those of adults, and we may soon reach a point where the punishments will be the same. Oddly, some of our

most advanced social critics have come out in favor of laws that would eliminate many of the distinctions between child and adult in the area of civil rights. This they do in the interests of "protecting" children. The school would be to help push us rapidly back to the fifteenth century when children were as liberated as everyone else, and just as unprotected.

I raise this point because the school is one of our few remaining institutions based on firm distinctions between childhood and adulthood, and on the assumption that adults have something of value to teach the young. That is why teachers must avoid emulating in dress and speech the style of the young. It is also why the school ought to be a place for what we might call "manners education": the adults in school ought to be concerned with teaching youth a standard of civilized interaction.

Again, those who are inclined to regard this as superficial may be underestimating the power of media such as television and radio to teach how one is to conduct one's self in public. In a general sense, the media "unprepare" the young for behavior in groups.

School is a social situation requiring the subordination of one's own impulses and interests to those of the group. In a word, manners. As a rule, elementary school teachers will exert considerable effort in teaching manners. But it is astonishing how precipitously this effort is diminished at higher levels. It is certainly neglected in the high schools, and where it is not, there is usually an excessive concern for "bad habit," such as smoking, drinking, and in some nineteenth-century schools, swearing, but as William

James noted, our virtues are as habitual as our vices. Where is the attention given to the "Good morning" habit, to the "I beg your pardon" habit, to the "Please forgive the interruption" habit?
