Homemakers' Reflections

Consider holiday gifts that save resources and celebrate life.

After you've made your list of receivers and given thought to their ages, likes and needs, let "Consume with Care" be your watchword for the 1979 holiday season.

Here are ideas for this kind of gift giving:

Give a gift of energy — your own.

Visit an elderly friend or babysit for a young mother so many times during 1980. Or volunteer your time and talents to a community agency that needs help.

Make your own gifts, such as children's stuffed toys, doll clothes, wooden blocks, knitted or crocheted items, baked goods or jams and jellies. Or give a plant that you grew from a cutting.

In buying, select items discriminately.

Ask yourself if it's useful — will it be used? Is it made of durable materials. Can it be recycled, repaired or reused in the future?

In addition, save resources in other ways.

Use last year's wrapping paper and ribbons or the comics from Sunday newspapers or butcher paper decorated with potato block prints or finger painting.

Or use leftover fabric cut with pink shears. Decorate with pine cones, acorns, and other natural materials.

For the tree, buy a live tree and plant it later.

Gifts that save resources and celebrate life will reflect the giving spirit, year after year.

Remodeling Precautions

Make basic repairs before cosmetic work when remodeling a home.

A new paint job or other cosmetic work can, with a small investment, spruce up an old home.

However, basic improvements must come first.

Don't forget to do the following:

Correct termite damage or structural defects before closing up the walls.

Add electrical wiring as necessary before closing up the walls — it is easier now than later.

Run all ductwork for heating and air conditioning before the walls are closed.

Fix or replace the roof before installing new drywall or plaster inside so that roof leaks will not damage the new interior work.

Fix the subfloor where partitions were removed, and properly prepare otherwise, before carpeting or installing a finished tile floor.

Replace all rotted exterior wood before the outside of the house is painted.

Put new drywall over old bad plaster or fix the plaster before applying paper or paint.

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County Gets \$616.46 Mix Drinks Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock says that gross receipts taxes on mixed drinks rose barely a jigger full during the third quarter of the year.

Bullock said mixed drink taxes for July, August and September totaled \$19,870, 132 compared to \$19,811,894 collected during the previous three month period.

Bullock's office mailed checks totaling \$616.46 to more than 200 counties and 350 cities as their share of the 15 percent gross receipts tax.

Colorado County received \$616.46 as its 15% rebate on the mixed drinks tax for the third quarter which ended Sept. 30, 1979.

Austin County received \$372.83, San Felipe \$72.85, and Wallis \$145.32; Fayette County, \$1,125.69; Lavaca County, \$307.98; Wharton County, \$4,168.33; Wharton \$1,925.23 and El Campo \$891.63.

Columbus Hospital Affiliates With WCJC Program

A new dimension in health care training will be incorporated into the Wharton County Junior College vocational nursing program when students begin in January to receive clinical experience at Columbus Community Hospital which is widely noted for its outstanding eye surgery and treatment.

"We are very pleased to have this excellent hospital as a clinical facility and plan to rotate all our vocational nursing students through the institution," stated Helen Pickett, director of the Columbus Community Hospital.

Columbus Community Hospital Administrator Layton Coleman and Nursing Services Director Dr. Ann Lauzon signed a contractual agreement last week with Wharton County Junior College to use the hospital as a clinical facility.

Other affiliated hospitals which participate in the one-year program include Eagle Lake Community Hospital, El Campo Memorial Hospital, Caney Valley Memorial Hospital and Gulf Coast Medical Center in Wharton.

The vocational nursing program begins in August each year and a satisfactory score is required on a pre-entrance test.

The testing dates in 1980 have been set for March 5, April 5, April 18, April 26, May 10, May 21, and June 4. Tests begin at 8 a.m. in room 214 of the J. R. Pickett Building and no prior appointment is necessary. Fee is \$10. Inquiries about admission

The Texas State Board of Public Accountancy will hold the CPA examination in Austin, Texas at The University of Texas Special Events Center on Nov. 7, 8, and 9, 1979. Approximately 650 Texas residents and 11 candidates from other states or territories of the United States will write this examination in Austin.

Board members Don M. Lynn and Sue Briscoe of Eagle Lake will conduct the examination in Austin. Other Board members will give the examination in Galveston, Fort Worth, San Antonio, and Lubbock. Approximately 7500 candidates will write the CPA examination in Texas in November 1979.
