Winterize Peach Trees

Just as around your home you do certain things to protect water pipes from winter weather, there are things that should be done to protect your peach trees from disease. Providing this protection could be compared to winterizing your home or car.

Peach trees are subject to a number of diseases caused by different fungi and bacteria. Some of these diseases can be best prevented during the fall and early winter.

Bacterial leaf spot is a bacterial disease of peaches which causes a loss of foliage and fruit quality during the growing season. The bacteria which caused the disease overwinters in one year old twigs on the trees. A fall

"OVER MY SHOULDER"

October's cattle acquired a chill as the first cool temperatures fell from the sky. Applications applied earlier or later are not effective. This timing will keep the weather from the northern parts of Texas but will fall somewhere between October 15 and December 15. The copper containing fungicides such as Kocide 101 and Copper Bordeaux mixture have proven to be the more effective bactericides for the control of this problem.

Bacterial canker is a disease of peach trees caused by another bacteria which infects trees in the fall. The control for this disease is the use of fall copper sprays. In winterizing peach trees remember the copper sprays and the importance of timing. Don't be a member of that group that puts something off until tomorrow. Copper sprays must be applied at the appropriate time to be effective.

Some see fed cattle prices remaining steady to the end of the year. The up coming holidays traditionally are the best time for the movement of turkey and chicken plus the increased amount of pork. The increased numbers of market hogs nation wide, up a gasping 117 percent from a year ago, started flooding the market channels in October. Central, South, and East Texas top hogs prices held up fairly well considering the hog numbers and finished the month at a strong \$34 to \$37. Starting in October the big fall runs seem to have already begun playing out. A smaller supply of cattle and with many cowboys sold out for this year point to fewer cattle moving into the market channels this fall than usual.

The pulse of November's demand will be made up of the activity in fed cattle

Pecan Producer Training Meeting in Shaws Bend Fri.

Pecan producers in Colorado and Fayette counties will be learning how to increase nut production and save money on Friday, November 9. A producer training meeting will be held that morning beginning at 9:30 a.m. in the pecan orchard operated by Mrs. Linda Aurich. The bottom is located off of FM 1890 north of Columbus in the Shaws Bend Community.

Each year, many landowners burn and bury thousands of dollars worth of pecan timber in Central, South and West Texas. The waste has not been intentional. The trees had to be removed so the best trees would have an opportunity to bear good nut crops.

Market for that timber did not exist, in most cases, but now markets for the wood from thinned trees are appearing. The wood from these trees may be sold as veneer for making fine furniture and paneling, lumber, structural materials for firewood. In the past, pecan growers have had to spend money to improve their groves and now they may be able to make some.

The educational program, jointly sponsored by Colorado and Fayette counties pecan committees in cooperation with their respective county extension agents, will take producers into the field to show them how to thin and determine volumes of timber in trees to be removed. They will also receive information on how to sell timber to prospective buyers.
