adopted the committee will begin work on another set of goals.

Policy Changes Considered
The board considered at length a possible policy change for Professional Growth Requirements, and also on a policy change for payment of insurance premiums for resigning employees.

The present policy calls for professionals (teachers, etc.) to complete six semester hours of work each five years. Supt. Harold King noted that under the present conditions, "a certain amount of what is required is wasted effort and not contributing much to the system." He said that the requirements need to be more specific in the areas of improvement desired.

He went on to say that the Eagle Lake Middle School and the Rice High School are members of the Southern Association and the association requires professional growth as set out in the Rice CISD policy. Some discussion ensued on the value of affiliation with the Southern Association and Asst. Supt. Charles W. DeShazo reported on a survey he had conducted showing that few schools in the area belong to the association.

Credit For Service
The superintendent pointed out that the district can get three hours credit for the teachers because of the in-service sessions held annually (over a five year period). He proposed that the district also conduct courses, workshops and learning sessions while the district to gain the remaining three hours required every five years. He stated that this would reduce the costs to the teachers and the sessions could be conducted directly in areas where weaknesses are known to exist. Under this proposal the professional would have to attend 16 school hours per semester hour or a

total of 48 hours over a five-year period in order to meet the requirements. The superintendent added that \$3,000 to \$5,000 added to the budget could possibly take care of costs for such sessions.

Membership in the Southern Association costs \$130 per school (ELMS and Rice High School) but every tenth year an extensive program of accreditation is carried out and the cost of the last session in 1975 ran over \$2,000.

Board president Clifton strongly suggested retaining Southern Association membership, at least for the present, and after a discussion, the board authorized the superintendent to draw up a new policy, retaining Southern Association membership but making the required "growth requirements" available to the professionals within the district. Further consideration of the policy is expected at the next meeting.

Insurance For Employees
Also bringing about a long discussion was consideration of a possible change in the payment of insurance premiums for resigning employees. The superintendent noted inequities in the policy which result when a teacher resigns early, enabling the district to have time to hire a suitable replacement, as compared to a teacher who waits until late in the summer. He noted that insurance of the teacher who resigns early is discontinued while the district continues to pay insurance on the teacher who resigns late, thus making it more or less an incentive for late resignations. King stated that the policy should be such that the incentive should be for the early resignation of the teacher, thus helping the district to have time to get a replacement, rather than for a last-minute resignation.

After discussion of the matter, the board authorized the superintendent to rewrite the policy making the insurance payments effective on a 12-month basis as part of the compensation for the professional.

Revised Policy
The revised policy will be considered further by the board at the December meeting. Also, the board authorized the superintendent to check on the validity of the penalty which the district imposes on teachers who make late resignations, and also on the possibility of moving the deadline up to an earlier date and "sticking by the deadline" if no replacement is available.

Audit Approved
The Rice Board also approved an audit of funds prepared by David B. Blomstrom, C.P.A. from Houston. A further discussion of the audit and publication of the balance sheets for the district's funds will be published in the next issue of the Headlight.

Bids Due Nov. 20
Supt. King also reported to the board on changes made in the location of the addition at the Eagle Lake Middle School and reported that bids will be opened at the Rice High School Administration Building at 2:00 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 20th.

Statement For Survey
A statement for survey work done by Leonard Frank, county surveyor, at Eagle Lake Middle School in conjunction with the improvement program was discussed and payment was withheld pending receipt of drawings to set out actual boundary lines of the ELMS school properties.

Real Estate
The superintendent also reported that repairs to heating rods at some schools could be made on a patchwork basis for several years until a long-range improvement program is developed. The roofing company contacted told the superintendent that a two-year guarantee could be given on the patchwork to be done.

"Stay Out Of Area"
Mayor Elmer Strum joined with Hospital Administrator Joe Chisholm in urging all persons who are not directly involved in the "disaster drill" to stay out of the area. "Your presence will only hinder the operation of this drill and could endanger your lives and the lives of those participating," so, unless you have some part in the exercise, please do not go to the scene of the accident, but to the hospital area while the drill is in progress," emphasized the mayor.

Officers in both areas will be assigned to keep unauthorized persons out of the area and they hope that they will cooperate so that this drill may be a complete success and prepare those involved in the event of such a possible actual emergency.

A cold front made its way across Texas Tuesday and passed through the Coastal Plains by early afternoon. A few light showers fell in the Rice Belt Tuesday, clouds will decrease Wednesday, however, a disturbance coming out of New Mexico will produce more clouds and some showers or thunderstorms Thursday through Sunday. Temperatures will be cooler Tuesday but will warm after mid-week.

Minimum humidity in the 60 to 70 percent bracket Tuesday afternoon created rather poor conditions for combining cotton. Second cuttings of rice will continue with showers causing only minor interruptions. Better harvest weather is due Wednesday with mid-morning start-ups likely. However, conditions will deteriorate again by Thursday.

Rain this week is likely to be too light or spotty to help aid dry pastures in the Coastal Belt.

2 Returned From Pen, Get Probation

Two men sent to the state penitentiary August 29th on terms of two to five years on a charge of burglary of the Elmer Texas Service Station in Weimar, were brought back to this county last Thursday by District Judge E. W. Patterson and their sentences reduced to probation and restitution. Judge Patterson reduced sentences of the two young men, Gary Peltz and Travis Strickland, to 3 years probation and \$1500 restitution each to Cecil Ellison, owner of the station, plus costs of court.

Three others who entered pleas of guilty to criminal charges Aug. 29th were sentenced, on terms of probation and another who waived indictment and pled guilty Sept. 17th was ordered to pay restitution and court costs.

Rogelio Marías, Jr. and Jesus Arreola entered pleas of guilty to the burglary of Sandy Creek Drive in Groesby (P. R. Hancock on duty at the time) and they received seven years of probation and were fined \$200 each and court costs. Also Gary Swenson had entered a plea of guilty to aggravated assault in shooting of Irene Swenson, and he was given four years of probation and fined costs of court.

Gary Legan entered the plea of guilty Sept. 17th to the burglary of the Red Johnson home and he was ordered to pay restitution and court costs.
