### Rust On Callie And Alicia

Heavy rusting occurred on Callie and Alicia Bermuda grass during the 1979 growing season. Producers who anticipated establishing new stands of Bermuda grass for hay or grazing purposes should be aware of this before making a selection. It is anticipated that this condition will continue to occur in the future even though damage in some years will be lighter than others.

Coastal and Common Bermuda grass can support infection of the rust fungus but to date have not been affected to the point where infection is damaging. While no one can say what will happen in the future, the fact remains that they have a higher level of resistance

## There's A Difference Between SCS, Soil Water District

Many people know what the soil conservation service is, and also know what the soil and water conservation district is, but they often get the two confused. Both organizations have the word "conservation" in their names, and they both have, as their objective, the conservation of our natural soils, water, and related resources.

The local soil and water conservation district is a local unit of state government charged with the responsibility of conserving our soil, water, and related resources. On the other hand, the Soil Conservation Service is a federal agency of the USDA which is charged with providing information and technical assistance to landowners who apply conservation practices on their land in order to preserve and protect it.

In 1939, the Texas Legislature passed the Texas Soil Conservation Law which set up the Texas Soil and Water Conservation Board. The local soil and water conservation district is a subdivision of state government.

SCS is the only federal agency which receives funds for direct technical assistance to soil and water conservation districts. Many other agencies also assist conservation districts such as foresters, other agricultural agencies, and universities.

When a landowner desires to develop a conservation plan, or to install conservation measures on his place, he makes his wishes known to the District Board of Directors. The directors then assigned a professional conservationist, employed by SCS, to give technical assistance to those who request it.

The important thing to remember is that the SCS conservationists are the technical assistance system of the conservation district, and that the SCS works with the district through written

### Insects Gaining

The magazine writer asserted the superbugs pose a real threat to the world, because hordes of them are building immunity to the poisons we spray over our world.

"The budworm (which eats cotton patch near Hearn—the first one found in Texas. It excited Texas and Washington officials as no other farm pest had, and they, in turn, excited cotton farmers over the South."

The officials thought they could eradicate the budworm, which had jumped the Rio Grande into Texas—by pulling up and burning every cotton stalk and other trash in a field where the pest was found.

No money was available at first to pay farmers for their cotton destroyed and for not planting cotton for three years, as Governor W. P. Hobby ordered, by proclamation. Farmers, who didn't believe that a pink bollworm had been found and that it didn't amount to much if it had, were almost in open war with the officials.

Mr. McDonald was in the fight against the pink bollworm, with the TDA until 1928, then with the U.S. Department of Agriculture until he retired in 1945.

Early in the fight, he decided that cotton poisons, as they were called in the earlier days, were not the way to control the pink bollworm. He was among those who believed the pink bollworm could not be eradicated, only controlled—and lived with. (You remember that cotton was the "bread of life" in Texas and the South in the 'teens, '20s and '30s.)

People yesterday—and to day—discovered that insects can and do build up immunity to poisons we spray on them. Human beings do not. Those same poisons destroy the "good" insects (ladybugs, praying mantises, etc.) and

cotton, tobacco, lettuce and tomatoes, all of them is just one of 364 so-called "superbugs" worldwide that have developed resistance to the poisons we spray on them.
