Rice Opens 1979-80 Basketball Season. The defending District 20-AA champions and State class AA finalist Rice Raiders boys will get their 1979-80 season underway this Friday when they travel to Victoria.

Returning starters from last year's squad include 6-6 forward Larry Hayes who will see a lot of action at post this season, 6-0 forward Dennis Bluntson and 5-11 guard Darryl Axel. Filling in the vacancies left by the graduating all-stars will be 6-2 forward David Grammer and 5-11 guard Darrel Appel.

The Texas Association of Basketball Coaches released its poll early in October and listed Bradburn number one, Rice second and Pittsburg third in the state in Class AA.

Jack Grammer, coach of the Raiders, is beginning his ninth season at the Raider helm and during the last eight years has taken them to the State Tournament twice.
