Fireplace Safety Measures

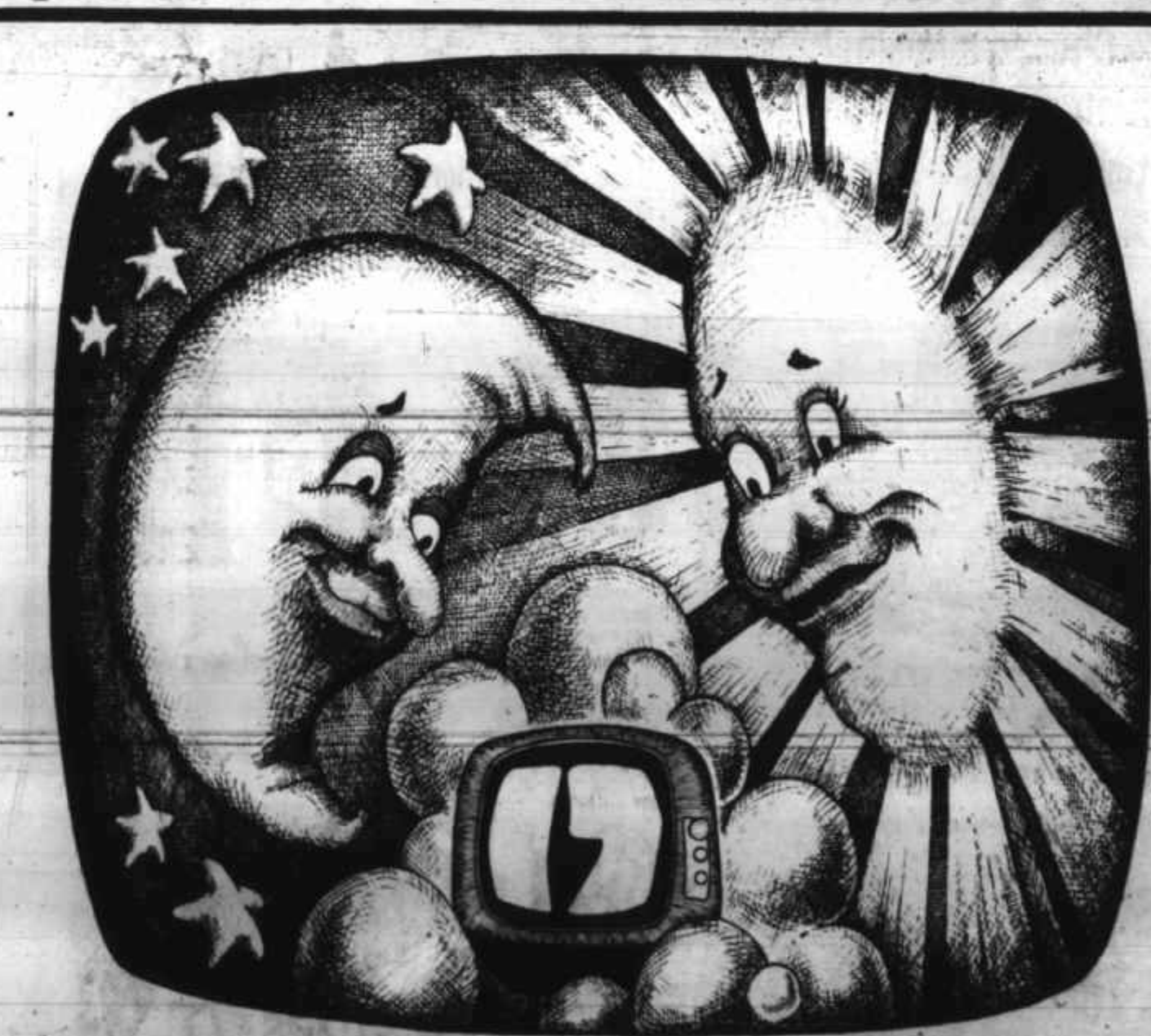
Neglect and careless fire place use often result in injury or a serious fire hazard.

Use the following "tips" to reduce the threat of accidental burns and fires:

- 1) Never use flammable liquids to start the fire.
- 2) Avoid excessive amounts of newspaper to build roaring fires in the fireplace. It's possible to ignite and deposit inside the chimney in the room.
- 3) Charcoal is great for steaks, but never burn it in a fireplace. Burning charcoal gives off deadly amounts of carbon monoxide, so use it outdoors - never in a fireplace.
- 4) Keep a metal or glass screen in front of the fireplace to catch flying embers. Flying embers can easily ignite carpet, furniture and other combustible items in the room.
- 5) Make sure no flammable materials hang down from or decorate the mantel. A spark from the fireplace can ignite such materials, and cause a fire.
- 6) Always make sure the fireplace is out before retiring at night. And, never, never close the damper with hot ashes in the fireplace. With the damper closed, hot ashes build up heat and may flare up and ignite the room while the family sleeps.
- 7) Use man-made logs according to directions on the package. Never break apart a man-made log as a means of quickening a fire.
- 8) Check both the chimney and the fireplace for defects and potential problems every couple of years, especially if the fireplace receives constant use during the winter.
- 9) Loose or fallen brick, cracked or broken fire lining, excessive soot accumulation and obstructions in or near the chimney are among the defects commonly found.
