

Raiders Make All-District Teams



The 1979 All-District 20AA team was selected by coaches throughout the district last week and two Raiders were chosen on the first team and three on the second, announced Mike Rice, head football coach at Rice High School. Those chosen are pictured above, l. to r., James Rhodes first team kicker, Robert Barrios first team offensive and second team defense, and John Schneider and Kenny Hyek, both second team defense. Rhodes, a sophomore, set a new career scoring record in his first season in varsity competition. The 200 pound lineman connected on 14 of 16 extra point attempts and was successful on two field goal tries. Barrios, a junior, came close to rewriting the Rice record book in pass receptions and yardage, catching 34 for 619 yards this season. Defensively he was the second leading tackler on the team with 92 for the season. Schneider, a junior backer, led Rice in tackles for the year with 119. The Rice High School Raider boys opened their basketball season last Friday night in Victoria suffering a 91 to 74 loss to the Stingrays. The Raider JV also came up on the short end of the score in their contest losing 49 to 44.

On Tuesday night of this week the Raiders traveled to Tomball to play a game that was not previously scheduled. The Raiders won that game by a score of 54 to 41. The Raider junior varsity lost their game by a score of 46 to 42.

This weekend the Raiders will be playing in the Victoria Tournament with their first game scheduled for Thursday against Austin Reagan at 6:45. The Raiders will play at 8:15 Friday if they lose against either Humble or Victoria Stearns.

Finals for the tournament are scheduled for 5:00 Saturday night.

The Raider varsity opened the contest hotter than a pistol last Fri. with junior Larry Haynes leading inside

attack and senior Darrel Appelt connecting from the outside. Rice opened up as much as a 12 point lead in that first quarter and led 22 to 13 at end of the quarter.

But the shots quit falling and the Stingrays began to take advantage of the Raider misses using the fast break and easy baskets from inside the lane. Besides losing the momentum the Raiders also had several starters in foul trouble forcing Raider head coach Jack Grammer to go to his bench early.

Senior guard Darrel Appelt picked up his fourth foul early in the first period of play and saw very limited action after that. He did foul out in the fourth quarter.

Victoria's 36 points in the second quarter gave them a 46 to 22 lead at half time.

Rice was unable to get back in the game in the final half as Haynes and forward Dennis Bluntson picked up their fourth foul, adding to the Raider problems. Most of the Raider subs were a little rusty having had only three days of workouts since football season had just ended.

Victoria on the other hand was playing as third game

of the season and showed signs of it during the latter stages of the game.

For the Raiders, Appelt and Haynes each scored 15 points with junior forward David Grammer adding 10.

JV Losses

The Raider junior varsity was also a loser in its game. They did, however, lead throughout most of the contest before a late fourth quarter rally by Victoria wiped out that lead for a 49 to 44 win. Rice led 17 to 14 after one period and 23 to 21 at half time. The third quarter ended at 35 to 35.

Michael Johnson had the hot hand for Rice scoring 22 points. The junior varsity is coached by Gil Stalbaum.

Best Tomball Last Tues.

The Raiders, varsity, picked up their first win of the season on Tuesday night defeating Tomball in Tomball. Though they did not make as good a showing as they did in their loss to Victoria, according to Coach Grammer, the Raiders

did pull out a 54 to 41 win. Rice led by 46 to 23 after three periods of play but managed to score only six points in the final half.

Wunderlich Gets 200th Win As Rice Girls Coach

Comes Two Games Into 10th Season; Record Now 200-74

Reuben Wunderlich, coach of the Rice High School girls' basketball team, notched his 200th victory with the Raider varsity's 64 to 42 win over Youkum at Rice Gymnasium on Tuesday night of last week.

Reaching that mark has come only two games into his tenth season at Rice and is matched against only 74 losses. Wunderlich, the only girl's coach that Rice has in its brief history, has averaged 22 wins against 8.2 losses in nine complete seasons.

This weekend the Raider varsity will test its strength in the Rice High School Tournament to be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday. The girls will play their first game against Dulles at 2:30 on Thursday and will play at 6:30 on Friday if they win or 6:00 if they lose. Their second round game will be against either Katy or Magnolia.

On Monday night of next week all three Raider teams will be playing in Youkum with the freshmen game to tip-off at 5:00 followed by the JV and varsity contests.

In that victory last week the Raiders got off to a poor start and trailed 18 to 14 after one period of play. Turnovers and poor shooting were the main reasons for that poor start.

But Wunderlich pulled his troops together and managed to outscore a disciplined Youkum team 24 to 10 in the second quarter to give the Raiders a 35 to 28 lead.

The Raiders held on to that

lead until only a few minutes remaining in the contest when they exploded for several quick baskets on steals and fast breaks to secure an easier than it seemed 64 to 42 victory.

Yolanda McTeer led all scorers with 19 points while Pam Banks had 12. Sharon McTeer, 10, Joyce Clayton seven and Phyllis Carter six.

Following the contest Rice High School principal Fred Gramman—congratulating Wunderlich for reaching the 200 mark on behalf of the students and administration of the Rice District. The varsity players also joined in the post-game celebration.
