by the committee in developing goals as a part of the adoption process," he added.

Goals adopted in 1976 as part of the current Five-Year plan are as follows:

Student Development
The Rice Schools shall help each student to develop personal knowledge, skills, and competence to maximum capacity, and to learn behavior patterns which will make each a responsible member of society. In terms of individual ability, each student shall achieve:

1. Intellectual Discipline: (a) Is able to read, comprehend, and assimilate written materials at the level of his placement. (b) Is able to communicate verbally with his own and other culture groups. (c) Is able to express his thoughts, feelings, and ideas in writing. (d) Is able to make mathematical calculations and to apply them in solving problems in a non-school environment. (e) Is able to utilize the concepts and principles of the humanities to the benefit of himself and to others. (f) Is able to apply basic principles of science to the solution of problems related to everyday experiences. (g) Is able to function independently and to evaluate his own work.

2. Economic and Occupational Competence: (a) Displays knowledge of the fundamental economic structure and processes of the American system and of the opportunities for individual participation and success in

the system. (b) Masters occupational skills prerequisite to enter and advance in the economic system. (c) Demonstrates competence in the application of economic knowledge to practical economic functions such as planning and budgeting obligations, financing major purchases, and obtaining desirable employment. (d) Recognizes the fact that "most people work and appreciate the dignity of work." (e) Is aware of the many different jobs that exist and of the prerequisite necessary to enter into a vocation.

3. Citizenship and Political Understanding and Competence: (a) Understanding of principles underlying community government as it relates to law, fire and local organizations. (b) Demonstrates knowledge about comparative political systems with emphasis on democratic institutions, the American heritage and the responsibilities and privileges of citizenship. (c) Develops the necessary skill for participating in the process of public and private political organizations and for influencing decisions made by such organizations. (d) Acquires competence in judging the merits of competing political ideologies and candidates for political office.

4. Physical and Environmental Health and Ecological Balance: (a) Ability to participate in exercises and games which develop his body and lay the foundation for a lifetime sport. (b) Acquisition of the basic

6. Competence in Personal and Social Relations: (a) Is able to associate with his peer group and is an accepted member of the group. (b) Participates in classroom activities and other situations with a minimum of problems for his age group. (c) Develops an understanding and acceptance of the need for authority and self-discipline. (d) Ability to adjust mentally and emotionally to acceptable change in society through a personal value system. (e) Awareness of the home and family relationship and acceptance of responsibilities.

7. Worthy Use of Leisure Time: (a) Is able to enter into productive activities for the sole reward of having produced. (b) Reads for pleasure as well as for information. (c) Has an association which provides a feeling of self-fulfillment.

Individual Differences
Differences in talents exist, and the school strives to satisfy this need by accepting each at his level of performance and placing him in an environment in which he can experience success and be challenged. This goal is satisfied via Plan A Services, Title I Programs and a diversified curriculum with different performance levels in Mathematics, Science, Social Studies and Language Arts at the secondary level and guest activities at the lower levels.

Accountability
A program of continuing evaluation for measuring the performance of the system in terms of competence of its products and efficiency of its structure and processes will be maintained. The system requires that the professional and non-professional staff be routinely evaluated in the performance of their responsibilities. Students' accomplishments are measured in addition to local standards by National norms based upon standardized instruments. Graduates are surveyed routinely for statistical information to be used in planning. Potential dropouts receive counseling prior to severance from the system. Fiscal responsibility is insured through adherence to state guidelines and both internal and independent audit controls.
