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RCISD Adopts Changes In Grading, Promotion

Rice School District's board of education in session Feb. 11th adopted changes in policies relative to grading, promotion and retention and graduation requirements to comply with the quarter or semester system under which the Rice District schools now operate.

The following is published in part from the new policy adopted by the board:

Grading System

The purpose of the grading system shall be to register in some form a student's progress. The grades shall generally express a student's progress. The student shall generally express a student's level of work measured against his capability and his peers. These grades shall be given and expressed in accordance with the student periodically.

In Kindergarten through Grade 3, reports to parents on student progress and performance will be indicated by marking as follows: E-Excellent, S-Satisfactory, N-Needs Improvement, U-Unsatisfactory.

Grades 4-6: grades that are used for honor roll determination will be given in numbers with the following interpretations: Excellent 90-100, good 80-89, average 70-79, poor 60-69, failure, below 60 and 1 incomplete. Other grades will be marked as follows: E-Excellent, S-satisfactory, N-needs improvement, U-unsatisfactory.

Academic Honor Rolls

Academic honor rolls may be used to provide incentives for students to strive for excellence in their school experiences. It is imperative, however, that each building principal clearly define the requirements to be satisfied by the students in order to be listed on the honor roll. These requirements shall be reviewed with the students immediately upon the beginning of each school term and with the local staff during pre-school inservice.

All honor rolls must satisfy the following requirements in order to establish consistency throughout the Rice District: An unsatisfactory grade in conduct or an disciplinary action administered by the principal during the report period will disqualify the student from the honor roll.

Band, athletics, physical education, office and laboratory assistantships, local credit courses and grades awarded in non-certified personnel are not to be included in figuring averages for the honor rolls. However, satisfactory performance in these subjects shall be expected of a student who will not qualify for the honor roll if the following grades are received in any of the above listed subjects: grades 6-12, a grade below 75; grades K-5, a grade of U; grades K-5, a grade of N or below.

Natural ability will be de-emphasized in establishing grades for activity courses such as music, athletics, physical education, art, etc. Emphasis will be placed on effort, attitude, cooperation, etc.

Promotion and Retention

Elementary: a child cannot earn passing grades the entire year and then be retained at the end of the year.

A student who is failing two or more of the major subject areas may be considered for retention. Retention should be based on the premise that it will help the child to repeat the work of a grade. Retention must not be used as a method of
