Former Supt. Vastine Gosch Passes Away

Relatives and friends were deeply saddened to learn of the death of Vastine Elmo Gosch of Altair, prominent educator for many years, who passed away at the Eagle Lake Community Hospital at 11:15 p.m. last Thursday, Feb. 29th. He was rushed to the hospital by the Garwood Fire Department - Emergency Corps only a few hours before his death. He had had a heart problem for the past ten years.

Last rites for Mr. Gosch were held from the chapel of the Mill-Bauer Funeral Home in Eagle Lake at 2:00 p.m. Saturday, March 1st, followed by graveside services at the Old Fellows Rest Cemetery in Columbus. The Rev. Wallace Shultz, United Methodist Church minister in Columbus, officiated. Mr. Gosch was a member of the Columbus church for many years.

Mr. Gosch was born January 18, 1902 in Cistern, Texas, the son of Albert and Lulu Marburger Gosch. He moved to Altair when the age of seven, with his family.

He was an educator and administrator for over forty years. He taught in the Flatonia Schools, twelve years by a 3 to 1 margin and at the Gatesville State School for Boys and was superintendent of the Sheridan School for approximately seventeen years.

For seventeen months before teaching positions, he enlisted in the United States Army during World War II and was a member of the cadre at the reception center in Minot, N. D. On August 11, 1925, he and Miss Helen, Grace Walker were united in marriage in the Eagle Lake Methodist Church. He had been a member of the Masonic Order and a member of the Colorado Valley Shrine Club and Arabia Temple Shrine.

Mr. Gosch was also an active member of the University of Texas Ex Students Association, the Colorado County Teachers Association and the American Association of Retired Persons.

County Cattle Raisers Reject Beferendum

Colorado County cattle raisers have voted overwhelmingly against the Federal Beef Research and Information Order, Daniel C. Streckfuss of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) announced last week.

In this county, 386 producers registered to vote and 295 cast valid ballots. Of the total, 17 were for the proposal and 278 were against, there were 12 invalid ballots.

The plan proposed a check-off program to finance beef research and promotion on a nationwide basis.

The beferendum was defeated by Texas producers by a 3 to 1 margin and also was defeated nationwide. A majority of at least 50% of the total cattlemen registered would have had to approve the beferendum in order to become effective.

very attractive bathrooms. The third apartment has one bedroom and comparable facilities with the two. Laundry facilities are made available in a foyer connecting the three apartments.

Luxurious carpeting is used throughout, with attractive vinyl flooring in the kitchens and bathroom. Adding to the decor of the apartment is the use of the brick walls in many areas of the apartments. The brick has been refinished and adds distinction and beauty to the setting of each unit.

The stairway to the apartments has been enclosed and will be finished with outdoor carpeting. A large back entrance has also room for a "high rise" patio area.

"All three units are being rented and we could have rented a dozen more," commented Mrs. Griffith who did much of the design and selection of materials used in the complex.
