

County Accepted For Nat'l Flood Insurance

The Federal Emergency Management Agency announced this week that effective February 29, 1980, Colorado County, Texas has been accepted into the National Flood Insurance Program.

This means, said Federal Insurance Administrator Gloria M. Jimenez, that property owners here are now eligible to buy flood insurance protection at affordable rates subsidized by the Federal Government.

Policy rates are effective at 12:01 a.m. of the day following the application date if purchased during the first 30 days of your community's eligibility in some cases there is a five day waiting period after the first 30 days have elapsed.

The policies can be purchased from any property insurance agent or broker licensed to do business in the area in which the property to be insured is located. Agents who are not members of the National Flood Insurance Program may obtain policy forms, rates, flood insurance manuals, and any other necessary information on the insurance aspects of the program from the servicing agent for the National Flood Insurance Program at the following address: National Flood In-

A 1977 Oldsmobile Station Wagon was sandwiched between two loaded gravel trucks in an accident on Highway 71 near the intersection of the Kallus-Beyer Road leading to the Santa Anna community, north of Columbus, at 5:10 p.m. Monday. Miraculously, the driver and two passengers in the station wagon escaped with injuries not considered to be critical.

Amour, 34, associate psychologist for the Colorado County Education Cooperative of Columbus, and was being followed by a gravel truck and trailer driven by Edward Avery, 30, of Eagle Lake.

The officer said the vehicles approached the intersection and another loaded gravel truck driven by Cesar Garcia, 59, of Houston, pulled onto Highway 71 off the Kallus-Beyer Road. The station wagon slowed down and was hit in the rear by the truck driven by Avery, knocking the station wagon into the rear of the leading truck driven by Garcia.
