Council To Get New Budget Mar. 25

A preliminary city budget for the 1980-81 year is expected to be presented to the Eagle Lake city council for inspection at its next session March 25, reported City Manager T. J. Smith at the council's regular meeting on Tuesday, March 11.

Mayor Elmer Strass indicated that a council workshop session would be held prior to the meeting to assist Smith in finalizing the preliminary budget. Council members also listed to the city manager indicating projects which needed funding most.

Smith also will be assigned to review the budget.

Eagle Lake approved a \$1,178,820 budget for the 1979-80 year which was up almost a third over the previous year. It was by far the largest increase ever recorded here, most of which resulted because the city assumed operation of the gas utility department.

Other action taken by the city council last week included:

- Approved a change order for work done by Mercer Construction Co. at the city's new water plant site on Davis St. calling for increased costs of \$180.
- Off-street parking at the plant was changed from asphalt to concrete, raising the cost \$300.
- Adjustment to an electrical motor control center increased cost of that project by \$150.
- Authorized purchase of two Smith & Wesson .357 caliber model 66 stainless steel handguns for the new water utility department at a cost of \$191.60, on request of Police Chief Lope Villarreal.
- Altered a report from city civil defense director Ed Tate on a recent state meeting held in Austin.
- Read a letter of thanks from the local unit of the volunteer ambulance corps to the city for improvement to the driveway at the ambulance garage and for new window shades in their meeting hall.

Police Check 3 Burglaries, 2 Thefts Here

Eagle Lake Police Department investigated three burglaries and two thefts during the past week.

Chief of Police Lope Villarreal was called Friday morning at 7:30 a.m. by Clarence Maturo to report that his C&L Used Furniture and Appliance building on East Main Street (former Mac's Marine Service location) had been entered sometime during the night. Investigation showed that the burglars knocked on a board window to cover a side window. The burglars entered from the door facing onto East Main Street.

Maturo reported that a used central vacuum unit and a 20-piece set of Leontone dishes, value \$50, and two 40-piece metric-inch combination socket wrench sets, value \$40, were missing from the building. The business has been entered on a number of previous occasions.

Beer Stolen

The officer investigated the entry was Carter's Place operated by Ruth Carter, at 415 Boothe Drive some time during Friday night or early Saturday morning. Entry was made by breaking through a bathroom wall and entering the main part of the business. The owner reported that 13 1/2 cases of beer were missing. Money, left in the cash register, was not taken.

\$5000 Worth of Tires Stolen

The third burglary was at the B&R Tire & Repair Co. on S Street, just east of Wilcox Elementary.

Chief Villarreal received a call at 10:30 a.m. Sunday of a large quantity of tires, new and used, had been stolen from the business.

Chief Villarreal found that the metal cabinet of the side of the metal-clad building and the burglars crawled through the hole and then opened a large overhead door through which they apparently took the truck tires.

The owner of the business reportedly was out of town during the week-end but he had left a large German Shepherd dog in the business. The dog was with in the shop when the burglary was located by an employee on Sunday morning.

25-Member Organizational Comm. To Develop Final Plans

An industrial development foundation for the Eagle Lake community moved a step nearer to reality Monday when those attending a Chamber of Commerce sponsored luncheon voted unanimously to form a 25-member organizational committee to develop final plans for implementation of the foundation program.

Twenty-five persons representing many business and agricultural interests were on hand for the "Dutch Treat" luncheon at Jack's Restaurant. The meeting was called by the chamber to follow up on the Allies Luncheon, held by the chamber's Industrial and Agricultural Committee.

After the steak luncheon, topped off with a special St. Patrick's Day dessert, the meeting was called to order by Ralph Truby, vice-president of the chamber and member of the Industrial Committee.

In the absence of Bob McIntire, president of the chamber who had to be out of town on business, Bill Harrison, Jr., chairman of the industrial committee, outlined the organization of an industrial foundation noting that it would be an "organized approach to attracting new industry to the community with the opportunity of screening those industries which might not be advantageous to the community."

At the Allies Luncheon, 25 of the 28 attending the luncheon, voted to pursue further the possibility of organizing an industrial foundation for this community.

Harrison said that he had talked to two of the three industrialists who had indicated that they now believe the program would be a good one.

"One of the goals in the development of new industry in developing an organized industrial development program, including:

1. Job development which would bring about an increase in the community's economy.
2. Resource development or the development of natural and creative resources with (Continued on last page)

Colorado County Water District and Improvement District No. 2 at Garwood will hold an election on Sat., April 5th for the election of two new directors to the board for 2-year terms.

The terms of William Carpenter and Mickey Smith will expire on April 5th. Both are seeking re-election and will be the only names listed on the ballot, according to Harry D. Lobry, the water district manager.

Voting will be done in the water district office with Clara Lobry presiding and Lucille Till Assistant Judge.

'80 Rice Program To Have No Set-Aside

Natl. Allotment Is 1.8 Million Acres, Target Up Slightly

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland announced no set-aside program will be implemented for 1980 crop rice, similar to the 1979 program, will have no diversion payments.

Bergland also announced a national rice acreage allotment of 1.8 million acres, the amount established by law. He added that the final target price and the loan and purchase rate will be announced after the final 1979 production estimate becomes available.

Current estimates are for a target price of between \$9.35 and \$9.65 per hundredweight and a loan and purchase rate of from \$7.05 to \$7.25 per hundredweight. The 1979 crop target price and loan and purchase rate are \$9.05 and \$6.79 per hundredweight, respectively.

A producer will be eligible for deficiency payments on allotment production after Dec. 31, should the target price for 1980 crop rice exceed the higher of (a) the national average market price received by farmers during the first five months of the 1980 marketing year.
