Expanding
Showtime**

Showtime, the national pay television service offered in Eagle Lake by Eagle Lake Cable TV Service, has announced plans to expand its daily programming schedule by four hours on weekdays and two hours on weekends and holidays beginning April 1. Showtime's daily schedule will be increased from the current eight hours Monday through Friday to 12 hours. Programming will begin at approximately 2:30 p.m. and end approximately 2:30 a.m., depending on the running time of the movies and specials. Weekends and holidays will also carry added hours of programming, up from the present 12 hours to 14 hours each day. **Energy Plans
Bring Storm
Of Protests**

[By Cong. J. J. Pickle] The Department of Energy has held hearings across the nation on its proposed Standby Federal Emergency Energy Conservation Plan. At least two proposals to restrict recreational boating one day a weekend and to require motorists to refrain from driving a certain day or two each week have met such a stormy reception that DOE may be back at the drawing board. Under the Emergency Energy Conservation Act of 1979, the President would have the authority to institute the standby plan, in whole or in part, if fuel supplies became critically short and if state fuel reduction targets were not met. The federal conservation plan would be designed to cope with market disruptions. At DOE's final hearing on the plan, held in Washington last week, I joined with other members of the Congressional Travel and Tourism Caucus in signing a letter opposing the recreational watercraft restriction and the vehicle use sticker measure.

**Final Session On Money
Management Here Mon.**

[By Donella Pantel, County Extension Agent] The final session on Financial Management for Women in the Eagle Lake area will be held Monday, April 1st in the council room of the Municipal Building and will be on the Cost and Wise Use of Credit. Those attending will receive a book on credit and information on understanding credit applications and the consumer's responsibility when they utilize borrowing on time. Presenting the program will be Travis Wegenhoff, executive vice president of the First National Bank of Eagle Lake, and Mrs. Donella R. Pantel, Colorado County Extension Agent. The program will begin at 10:00 a.m. Monday at the city council room. Some questions to be answered will be: "How to establish a credit-rating for women?" "How to understand credit contracts?" "What various credit regulations provide?" "Where to go for credit counseling?" "Who can get credit?" "Pros and Cons of Credit." The March 24th session on Financial Management for Women was on Savings and Investments presented by Wegenhoff and Ms. Sue Briscoe, Eagle Lake C.P.A. On savings, Mr. Wegenhoff discussed establishing savings goals to meet business and family needs. One method he pointed out to use in meeting these goals is to consider the amount to be saved each month as a fixed expense. Deciding where to save was discussed considering safety, liquidity, return, and services offered. Mr. Briscoe discussed investments and stressed that you need to be financially sound before you consider investing. People should have not just property but liquidity. She advised short term liquid investments such as treasury bills, money market funds, and gold and silver coins and avoiding long term fixed investments at this time. She felt that land and income producing properties in this area were a good investment. She did say that the Eagle Lake and surrounding area in Texas is one of the best places to live as far as small towns and real estate goes for the time being. People should strive to get out of debt and begin buying on a cash basis if possible. Other points included being flexible and diversified, study or read current publications since the economy literally changes daily, and try to attend seminars to hear other people's viewpoints.

**House of Rep.
OK's Funds For
Rail System Study**

U. S. Rep. J. J. Pickle, D-Austin, announces that a House subcommittee has approved funding for engineering studies of a high speed rail system through the Texas Triangle, linking Austin with San Antonio, Houston and the Dallas-Fort Worth area. The congressman termed the recommendation of the Transportation and Commerce committee "encouraging," noting "inevitably our society will have a high-speed rail system along the triangle. Nothing is more important to a full service transportation network than this type of development." Triangle train service already has received the blessings of Amtrak, the Department of Transportation and the Texas Railroad Commission. The Bureau of the Census will use 65,000 cardboard desks for clerical workers for the 1980 census because it's cheaper than renting furniture.
