A meeting will be held at the Eagle Lake Ambulance Hall (over the Police Station) at 7:30 p.m. next Wednesday, April 9 to organize the Texas Association of Emergency Medical Technicians. It is NOT necessary to be an EMT to become a member.

The objects of TAEMT are to: (1) improve pre-hospital skills in emergency care through educational programming; (2) interact with allied health professionals (doctors, nurses, etc.) to improve emergency care in Texas; (3) promote positive legislation for developing emergency care delivery; and (4) educate the general public in pre-hospital emergency care.

While only EMTs have a vote at State and National levels, anyone involved in emergency care can become a member. EMTs, physicians, nurses, hospital administrators, concerned citizens, etc. "Only you can make your voice heard," said Darius Brisen, appointed interim Chapter Chairman by George Vick, Director of TAEMT - Region 8, who will be present at the meeting to answer any questions anyone might have.

"We urge all interested people to attend the meeting and find out what TAEMT is all about," continued Mr. Brisen.
