Dr. R. R. Thomas Continues in AAFP Family Practice

Dr. Raymond R. Thomas has completed continuing education requirements to retain active membership in the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy for the year was called the American Academy of General Practice.

The requirements call for members to complete a minimum of 150 hours of accredited continuing medical study every three years. Members become eligible for re-election at the end of the third year following their election to membership. The Academy, the country's second largest national medical association, was the first national medical group to require members to keep up with medical progress through continuing education.

The academy, founded in 1947 and headquartered in Chicago, Ill., was instrumental in the establishment of a new primary specialty in family practice in 1969. The new specialty is expected to increase the numbers of family physicians available to serve the public in the future. The Academy's continuing education program is the foundation of eligibility for family doctors now in practice who apply for certification in the new specialty.

Texas A&M Muster Set Apr. 21st

Former students of Texas A&M University will assemble at Columbus Tuesday, April 21 for the annual Texas Aggie Muster, announced chairman Bill Harrison, Jr. of Eagle Lake.

The Muster activities will begin at 7 p.m. at the Holiday Inn, Jr. in Columbus, according to the chairman.

Harrison said the Muster is open to all former students and their families, parents of students and friends of Texas A&M.

The Muster dates back to the mid-1890's and has been held annually since. More than 350 Musters will be held around the world this year, Harrison said.

Every Muster ceremony is the same, Harrison reported. The Texas Aggies pay their respects to all those who are absent, because of death, since the last Muster. When the names of the honored dead are called from the Muster Roll, a friend of the deceased answers, "Here."

Pickle's comments came during investigatory hearings before the Ways and Means Oversight Committee. Congressman Pickle is the ranking majority member of the subcommittee.

"Since 1975, our subcommittee has pushed for a permanent clean-up of this Teamster fund, and in 1977, we halted the government's

appointment of independent asset managers," Pickle said. "Today we learned that not all is going well," he added.

Teamster Central States Pension Fund trustees have not allowed Department of Labor or Internal Revenue Service personnel in their building for over a year and the trustees now refuse to file monthly reports to the IRS.

"I urge the Administration to redouble the clean-up to close the all-too-many loose-ends. The Subcommittee's main goal is to insure that the fund is able to provide the full benefits to the half-million Teamster participants. This can never be if we return to the shady and self-dealing investments made in the past," Pickle concluded.

May 1 Is Deadline For 1980 Rice Producers

The monthly letter from the County office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in Columbus, reports that the State Committee has determined that for 1980 only the final date to transfer, release and to allocate rice allotment acreage is May 1st. Rice producers who have completed the planting of the 1980 rice crop may certify to that they allocate the acreage to a farm, advises Daniel C. Strickland, county executive director for the ASCS.

1980 Target Prices Acting Secretary of Agriculture Jim Williams announced

red-changes in the 1980 farm programs, including higher target prices for wheat and feed grains. Producers who stay within their normal crop acreage will qualify for farm program benefits based upon the new announced target prices, Williams said.

President Carter signed the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1980 which raises the 1980 wheat target price to

\$3.63 a bushel and the 1980 corn target price to \$2.35 a bushel," Williams said. "We are also setting the 1980 sorghum and barley target prices at \$2.50 and \$2.35 per bushel, respectively."

However, Williams said producers who want to receive the higher target prices must stay within their normal crop acreage.

Williams also announced the 1980 target prices for upland cotton and rice and the loan price for rice. The target price will be \$8.4 cents per pound for upland cotton and \$9.49 per hundredweight for rice. The 1980 loan rate for rice will be \$7.12 per hundredweight.

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
