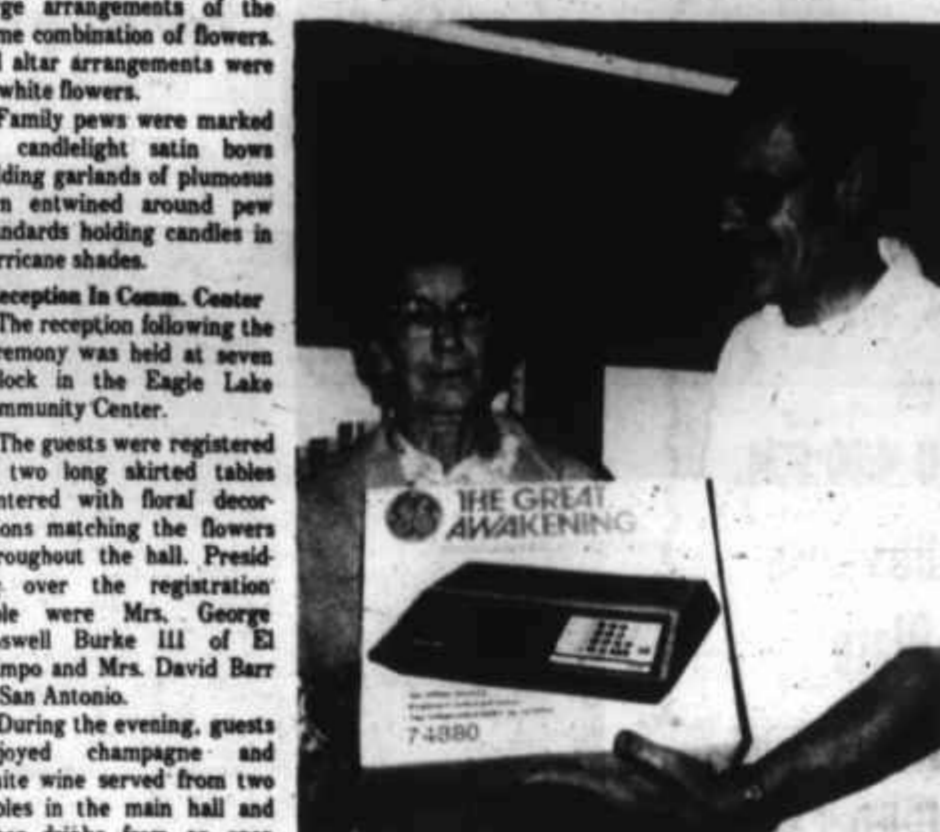

99-yr. Rape Conviction Overtured

A 99-year prison sentence handed down in 25th Judicial District Court in this county on the 1977 rape charge against a Columbus man, Ben C. Scott, was overturned last week by the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

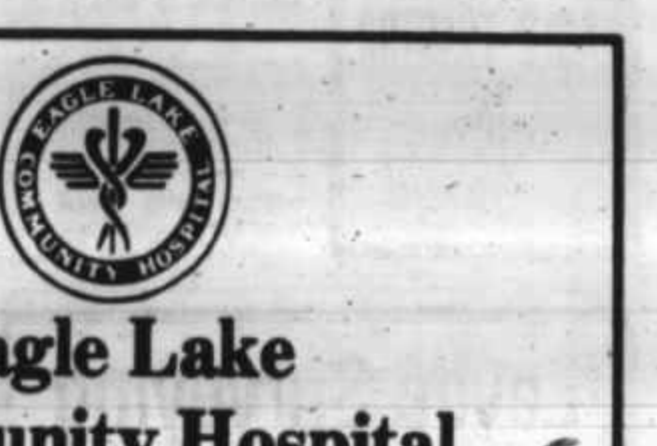
The appeals court ruled that the conviction was not valid since Scott was convicted on a theory not alleged in the grand jury's indictment. The indictment alleged a "gravated rape" by compelling the victim to submit to sexual intercourse by threat of imminent death.

The appellate court ruled that the jury's charge that the words "or serious bodily injury" were added to the indictment's original charge, may have been misinterpreted by the jury.

In the indictment, the victim, who is white, testified that Scott, who is black, forced her to stop her car on Highway 71 north of Columbus while en route to Austin.

The district clerk had not received official notification of the action by the court of Criminal Appeals Tuesday of this week, however, Judge B. H. Schraub reportedly has issued a bench warrant to return Scott to the Colorado County jail for confinement until such time as the appeal is started, tentatively April 28th or 29th.

We trust each family to act responsibly in making a decision about the support they will give their church during the coming year," he stated.

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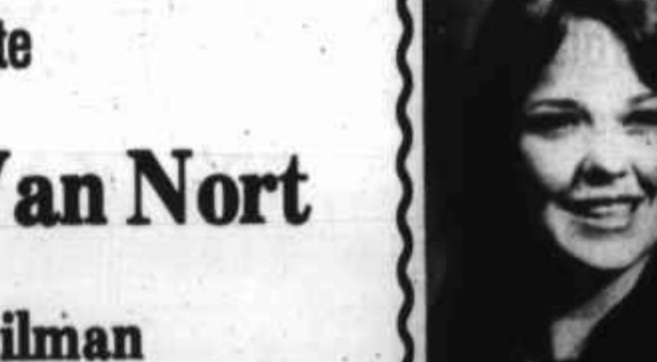
