The woman, Neidred Maddox Martin of Hallettsville was alone in a 1979 Mustang, headed east when the vehicle went out of control on a curve. The car swerved to the left and then off the road on the right side and hit a culvert and rolled over several times. Mrs. Martin was thrown from the car and the car came to a stop partially on her body. A number of passers-by managed to get the car off of her body. She was brought to the Eagle Lake Community Hospital by members of the Eagle Lake Ambulance Corps and was still in the hospital Monday.

The vehicle was reported to be a total loss. Highway Patrolman Joel Garcia of Eagle Lake investigated the accident.

5 Highway Projects In County Ok'd

State Highway and Public Transportation Commission has approved a \$58.7 million program to improve almost 2,000 miles of state-maintained highways in Texas, including five projects in Colorado County.

The 1981 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement program will include a wide variety of work in all sections of Texas. The program contains a total of 334 separate projects located in 140 counties.

District Engineer Carl V. Ramert of Yousum said the work in this area includes: SH 71 from 3.5 miles northwest of Columbus to FM 109, a distance of 2.5 miles, which will receive additional surfacing at an estimated cost of \$145,000;

FM 109 from the Austin County line to 1.6 miles west of the county line, widened at an estimated cost of \$92,900;

FM 333 from 5.9 miles west of SH 71 to 5.5 miles west will receive a seal coat application at an estimated cost of \$42,700;

FM 1093 from the junction of FM 3013 to the Wharton County Line, a distance of 7.0 miles, will receive a seal coat application at an estimated cost of \$54,900;

FM 2434 from FM 155 south of Weimar to 7.3 miles east will receive a seal coat application at an estimated cost of \$57,400.

An increase in cloudiness will be noted in the Coastal Plains as southerly winds bring in Gulf moisture and Wednesday widely scattered thundershowers may develop. Showers should increase Thursday and Friday as a storm system approaches from the west. Showers are expected to taper off Saturday. Warmer nighttime temperatures are expected through Friday. Some cooling is due Saturday.

Fog the Rice Belt. Warmer nighttime temperatures through Friday is good news for rice growers. Two to three consecutive nights with minimums above 60 are needed for rice to come out of cold shock, so from a temperature standpoint, most rice that survived the cold spell should be out of shock and able to tolerate herbicide applications by Thursday or Friday. However, showers may interfere with spraying operations at that time. Temperature records suggest that rice in the Houston-Galveston area may be out of shock already. Although some cooling of soils is expected the latter part of this week, soil temperatures should remain favorable for germination of rice and cotton.
