Therefore when ripples are caused by excessive moisture and "natural" lengthening of the fibers, the best remedy is to lower the humidity, either through use of a dehumidifier or a lower thermostat setting.

Higher Room Temp. Adds To Wavy Carpets

Air conditioning thermostats set at 78 degrees F. or above during the summer may result in a "wave" wall to wall carpet. The possibility of ripples developing in the carpet increases as reduced cooling removes less moisture from carpet fabrics.

As most air circulates over-carpet, fibers absorb moisture from the air until their capacity is reached. Elongation or a lengthening of the fibers results.

Fibers absorb moisture at different rates. Wool, cotton and jute absorb more than man-made fibers. Wool, for example, will absorb as much as 16 percent of its own weight, whereas only minute absorption takes place in polypropylene.
