Weather across the Texas Coastal Plains the next three days or so will resemble summer conditions. Warm temperatures, light southerly breezes and a daily chance for widely scattered showers should dominate the weather features. Wednesday could be the best day for showers as a weak upper level weather disturbance moves eastward. No wind changes in temperatures or weather patterns are indicated for the second half of the week.

For the Rice Belt, nights are staying consistently warmer in the 80s now, so cotton, rice and pastures should do much better. Herbicide injury to rice should not be a major problem. However, weather through Thursday will offer a daily risk of rain interference. If the upper level weather system moves across Central Texas Wednesday, it could mean that the wetter northern counties of the Rice Belt will again be the most likely area threatened by additional delay of field work.

Cow Rabies Case Confirmed At Weimar

Possibly the first case of rabies in a cow was confirmed Monday, April 28th at Weimar by the State Health Department.

Dr. Bill Rugeley said it was the first actual case he'd seen, but that he had the test made because the symptoms were so typically those he'd been taught to look for according to a story in last week's Weimar Mercury.

The cow had a strange bellow, he said. She bellowed constantly, making sounds while inhaling as well as exhaling, sounding something like a donkey.

Dr. Rugeley explained that this was because the throat muscles were constricted. The condition makes the cow sound like she's choking, and the danger is that the animal's owner might reach into her throat trying to dislodge what she's choking on.

"Do that person who gives protection," he said, and you have a good chance of contracting rabies. Now he has the cow's two-week-old calf under observation, because it could pick up the disease through nursing, along with a course of the calf was switched to when its mother got sick, and the nurse cow's own milk.

Additional Ground-Water Dev. Possible In Local 3-County Area

Additional development of ground water is possible in most of Colorado, Lavaca and Wharton counties, according to a report prepared by the U.S. Geological Survey in cooperation with the Texas Department of Water Resources. The 101-page USGS report says more ground-water supplies could be developed in these counties because of the large quantity of ground water in storage in the area, estimated at about 180 million acre-feet (58.6 trillion gallons). Less than 1 percent of this is being pumped each year, mostly for irrigation of rice.

Additional development should proceed with caution, however, the report says, because of the attendant consequences of land-surface subsidence and declining water levels. Land-surface subsidence is not a serious problem at this time. Available data indicate that the maximum subsidence in the three-county area has been in less than one foot, and in most places is less than six inches.

Water-level declines of as much as 40 feet have occurred in eastern Lavaca County, and a decline of 65 feet in 42 years was recorded in a public supply well at El Campo in Wharton County. More than 27,000 acre-feet (90.3 billion gallons) of ground water was pumped from wells in Colorado, Lavaca and Wharton counties in 1974, the year the federal-state study began. The authors of the report said present pumping is about the same, but natural recharge to the two main aquifers from which water is pumped in the area is only 116,000 acre-feet (37.8 billion gallons) per year. This leaves a net withdrawal of 161,000 acre-feet (52.5 billion gallons) per year.

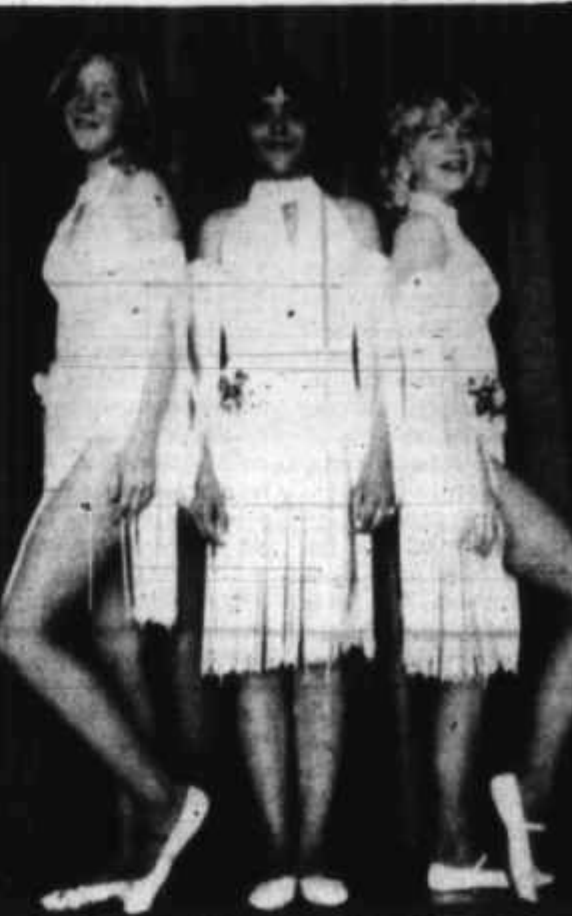
