County Buys Car For Sheriff's Dept.

Colorado County Commissioners' Court opened the May session Monday by accepting the bid of Morrison Ford of Columbus, \$5,710, for providing a new 1980 Ford LTD-5 for the Colorado County sheriff's department.

In other action, the court approved a road easement presented to the court, 60 feet wide and 1.715 acres, in a subdivision north of Columbus for use as a public road. The easement was given to the county by V. L. Marek, Sr., Crockett Leyendecker and Julius Ruffeno. The road was reported to be in good condition. Since it is in the Tumlinson Survey, the road was numbered 323 and will be known as the Tumlinson Road. Oil and gas mineral rights were retained by the owners.

Since Commissioner Leyendecker was involved in the assessment, he abstained from voting on the acceptance and it was approved by vote of Commissioners Loessin, Veselka and Stiles.

2 J.P.s Attend Training
The court took recognition of the fact that Justice of the Peace Dennis Poppe in J.P. Prec. 3, and Judge Joe Kaye in J.P. Prec. 4 attended the required Justice of the Peace training school.

Commissioner Stiles suggested that the court should recognize those who do not attend the training as required by law, as well as those who do. This prompted Judge Crank to comment that the Administrative Judicial Council's office has indicated that it is investigating the possibility that those J.P.'s in this county who do not attend the required training, might be removed from office.

Buy Portable Radio
The court authorized the purchase of a third portable radio unit for the Sheriff's department. The unit's cost is \$1295 which the county will pay \$385.56 and the remaining 75 percent by the Criminal Justice agreement for this area.

The four commissioners and Judge Crank took the oath of office as a board of equalization and convened as a board at 2 p.m. to go over local tax rolls in the office of Tax Assessor and Collector Henry J. Hajovsky to determine if changes need to be made in any assessments.

The board plans to be in session on May 15. The court was presided over by Judge Crank. Refreshments of cake and ice cream were served by the hostess. The meeting was concluded with prayer by Mrs. Avis Goolbsy.

Sr. Citizen Assessment Report Cites Needs In Colorado Co.

A Needs Assessment hearing was held in Colorado County on April 25 and a report was written by Ma. Kerry Hughes, program specialist from Houston Galveston Area Council.

Her report follows in part: "The need for transportation was stressed by documenting those served by the County Senior Citizen van: widow women unable to drive, great number of older Texans in Colorado County. Transportation provides the seniors a way to grocery shop, eye clinic, light and gas companies, and court house. The van stays within the County lines and travels a regular route on a specific schedule and so the seniors need to be convinced that perhaps some of their shopping habits must be changed to receive the service. Seniors using the van gain a sense of independence.

"Education of the general public and the Senior Citizens is needed in several areas in Colorado County including type of services available, development of positive attitude toward the elderly; and improvement of coordination of facilities such as the schools.

"A nutrition program was identified as a need, but the county geography does not lend itself to the usual type of nutrition program. The most feasible plan discussed was the possibility of utilizing the three school districts that have existing eight cafeterias.

"In-home Services are needed for some Seniors in Colorado County in order to help them stay in their own home. There are few people willing to provide low cost home services. Interest was expressed for a day care center for older citizens who have families to care for them in the evenings but work during the day. Regulations have been tightened with the Department of Public Welfare on in-home services to only include those clients released from a hospital or nursing home within the last 30 days.

Senior Citizens Director Resigns

Jeanine W. Lowrey Named New Director Effective May 15

Constance S. Iise, director of the Senior Citizens program in Colorado County for the past two years, submitted her resignation to the Colorado County Commissioners' Court, for reasons set out in the following letter. The resignation was accepted by the court on a 3-1 vote with Precinct 2 Commissioner Rafael Veselka voting against. Precinct 3 Commissioner Crockett Leyendecker made the motion to accept the resignation and it was seconded by Judge Lester Crank. Precinct 1 Commissioner Otto Loessin and Precinct 4 Commissioner Bill Stiles voted for the motion.

Colorado County Commissioners' Court Monday afternoon named Mrs. Jeanine W. Lowrey of Columbus as the new Senior Citizens director in this county to succeed Mrs. Iise this Thursday, May 15th.

The court went into executive session to hear four applicants for the position. Mrs. Lowrey, M. A. Miller and R. Green-Columbus and Mrs. Laura A. Cullen of Eagle Lake.

Judge Lester Crank said the court had a tough decision to make between two well-qualified applicants. Mrs. Lowrey and Mrs. Cullen. He noted that the deciding factor was the desire of the court to keep the office in the County Agricultural Bldg. open 6 1/2 hours for five days a week instead of 8 hours on four days as in the past.
