County Producing 1,962 Bbls. Crude Oil Daily

The eighth consecutive year of production at the maximum efficient recovery rate in nearly all of Texas' fields once again pushed the state's output of crude oil and condensate above the one-billion barrel mark: The total of 1,006,845,138 barrels included almost 980 million barrels of crude oil and just over 28 million barrels of condensate, according to figures compiled by Texas Midcontinent Oil and Gas Association.

The billion barrel level of crude and condensate production is one that has been achieved each year since 1965. However, a downward production trend continued for the seventh consecutive year since Texas production peaked in 1972.

Colorado County, which has had recorded production since 1932, last year produced 716,141 barrels of crude oil and condensate at the rate of 1,962 barrels per day. Production in 1979 boosted Colorado County's production total through the end of the year to 22,654,999 barrels.

In 1979, 22 counties produced more than 10 million barrels of crude oil and did evangelistic work.

Red Cross Swim Lessons At Sheridan June 9-20

Red Cross swimming lessons will be offered at the Sheridan Swimming Pool from June 9 through June 20. Registration will be combined with the first day's lesson on Monday, June 9, beginning at 8 a.m. at the pool.

Courses will be offered in the following: beginner, advanced beginner, intermediate, swimmer, and basic rescue and water safety.

In order to qualify for a beginner, the youngster must be six years of age or entering the first grade this fall. There will be a beginner's class each half hour beginning at 8 a.m.

The basic rescue class, designed for eleven-year-old swimmers and older, offers personal safety skills that will enable swimmers to meet emergencies if they arise and to provide basic safety information to families and individuals engaged in recreation in, on and around the water.

Advanced lifesaving for individuals who are fifteen years or older will be offered only if there are six or more interested swimmers. Course time is two hours per day.

Classes will be taught by qualified Red Cross Water Safety Instructor Tammy Walker. Assistants will be Jennifer Galtney, Kim Winderlich and Roberts Gears.
