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Sun Oil Completes Frnka Well

The successful completion of the No. 3 W. R. Frnka well five miles northwest of Frnka, Texas, is reported to be an extension of the Hancock Field in the southwest part of this county.

The well, located on a 640-acre lease in the R. A. Prosser Survey 12, A-920, flowed 430,000 cubic feet of dry gas per day through Miocene perforations at 2,694.97 feet. The operator reported an absolute open flow of 2.38 million cubic feet of gas a day. Total depth is 6,715 feet.

Hancock Field has established Miocene gas pay beds from 2,000 to 2,625 feet.

At last report, Texas Oil & Gas Corp.'s No. 1 Hancock "N" near Frnka, Texas, was reported at 14,955 feet and running logs.

Exxon Corp. drilled to 15,032 feet and abandoned the No. 1 A. L. Pavlock, a deep test five miles southeast of Columbus, however, Exxon was reported at 12,700 feet on another deep test, the No. 1 Daisy Deep, 2.5 miles southeast of Columbus.

Realistic water action is created by two 350 horsepower pumps that recirculate two-and-a-half-million gallons of water a day. Guests are secure in two-ton boats that float according to the whim of the river rather than being confined to tracks or channels. Therefore, each trip is unique and passengers are exposed to the same sense of adventure.

ENERGY-SAVING HOME REDUCES ELECTRICITY COSTS FOR VICTORIA COUPLE

Their home at 213 Taos was built with less glass to help cut down on heat gain, and was thoroughly caulked and sealed to prevent air leakage. It also is equipped with an energy efficient heat pump that reduces heating and cooling costs.

To get the maximum benefit from their EEA home, the Rothwells added solar film to the west windows and a patio cover to the sliding glass door. They installed ceiling fans, adjusted their water heater to a lower setting of 135°, and keep the thermostat at 78° in summer and between 65° and 66° in winter. During the winter, they also leave the drapes open in the daytime to take advantage of the solar heat, then close them at night so they can serve as an insulation to keep heat inside.

Mr. and Mrs. Rothwell advise others preparing to buy or build a home to remember that it is more economical to build energy-saving features into a house during construction than it is to add them later. These features also will increase the resale value of the house, they believe, since "home-buyers always ask the seller how much the electricity bills run."

The exact amount of savings will depend on individual circumstances.

Boating-related fatalities include deaths caused by fires, collisions, swimmers struck by boats and drownings related to boat operation, the department said.
