Diesel Tank Stolen

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City Gets
\$21,199.53 In
Sales Taxes

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday said a small decrease in the June city sales tax rebates may indicate consumer caution about the economy and spending patterns.

While sales in the last quarter of 1979 and the first quarter of 1980 were generally strong, sales tax returns now are picking up the period where national credit restraint was being urged, he said.

The City of Eagle Lake received a check for \$21,199.53 to 1980 payments to 1979 (\$58,588.24).

Columbus' check was for \$22,867.51 to make 1980 payments total \$95,061.16, up 24%.

Hallettsville's check was for \$15,389.28 to make the 1980 total \$72,405.89, up 21%.

Sealy received a check for \$24,974.39 to make the 1980 total \$100,607.85, up 24%.

Weimar's check was for \$4,628.89 to up the 1980 total to \$48,887.32, up 49%.

Walls received \$2,684.96 to make the 1980 total \$2,842.18, up 8% over the 1979 total at this date.
