tioning on the second and third floors of the courthouse should be ready to turn on soon. However Judge Crane noted that radiation of heat from the building would make total use impractical. He said that the sub-contractor should however have the right to test the systems as needed.

The court approved the purchase of a new pick-up mounted weed sprayer for Precincts 1 and 3. They will share in costs and use of the sprayer.

Only two bids were received and one by Cibola Mfg. Inc. for \$10,920 was invalid because of a lack of the 9% guaranty asked for in the specifications. The successful bidder was Chem-Tec Inc. of Fredericksburg which offered a sprayer for \$10,634 with delivery in 30 to 45 days. One day of schooling at the factory and two days on the job were included in the bid. Vote on the motion to accept the Chem-Tec bid was unanimous.

Close Frontage Road The court approved a request from Malvern Construction Co. to temporarily close an 110 foot frontage road between Roads 105 and 906 for use of the road by the company's equipment on the Highway 71 by-pass project north of Columbus. The contractor furnished the court with slips of approval.

After a discussion on a request for funds for ambulance corpman to the annual Texas A&M Firemen's Training School, the court skipped any action on the request. Judge Crane pointed out that the City of Columbus had approved \$375 for five firemen to attend the school. One of the Columbus firemen is also a carpenter in the city and asked the court for assistance with the \$100 tuition. Judge Crane said he had written to Eagle Lake and Columbus corps and had received no information that anyone from those units planned to attend. To qualify for the school, the corpman must also be a fireman.

Judge Crane noted at the end of the meeting that an inspection was due in this county Friday, June 20th for final inspection and possible certification of the county jail under the state's Jail Commission Standards program.

Distribution of the board appointment has been such so as to have board members in

all areas of the county and Precinct 4 Commissioner Bill Stiles recommended that this procedure be followed.

Mrs. Reinhardt informed the court that the board could be increased to 15 members if desired, however discussion indicated that this might not be the right answer to an effective committee.

Precinct 3 Commissioner Crockett Leyendecker advised that he is going off of the commissioners' court on Jan. 1, 1981, and stated that he would not attend any of the meetings. Leyendecker pointed to the growing welfare programs in this county and indicated that he could not support the addition of further programs.

Members of the committee responded by pointing out that the work of the committee is appreciated and the children who need foster care or similar aid and is not intended to be a welfare program.

The new president discussed plans of Rotary International's new president for the 1980-81 year, themes of which will be "Take Time To Serve." He urged that members take time to

signified by landowners on the road. Also the City of Columbus and Highway Dept. had approved the request. The contractor said the action would reduce working time in that area by some ninety days.

The court authorized Precinct 1 Commissioner Loessin to draw up a new contract with Frank Lowe for mowing along county roads in Precinct 1 on an hourly basis.

Accepted a letter of agreement from Hollis Massey allowing Loessin to build a new fence 8 feet south of the boundary and onto a 50-acre Massey tract for purposes of improving drainage along a two-block area. The letter pointed out that the land would remain the property of Massey and the action not endanger his ownership of the land. Precinct 4 Commissioner Stiles said that the county normally obtains an easement or deed to the property before doing any kind of work on such property and expressed fear that acceptance of the letter of agreement might open a "panda's box." He voted against the motion to accept the agreement.

The court tabled for possible action at the July meeting: requests to approve telephone applications (since no phone company representative was present); and approval of a new one-year contract for oil and gas valuation engineers, Latham and Stults of Austin. The county's portion of the proposed fee for 1981 services was estimated at \$19,192.50, up from \$15,597 paid for 1980 services. The court tabled action to determine if other entities sharing the use of the firm, the county and Columbus school districts, had received and approved similarly-sized increases. Action is expected on the latter issue next month.

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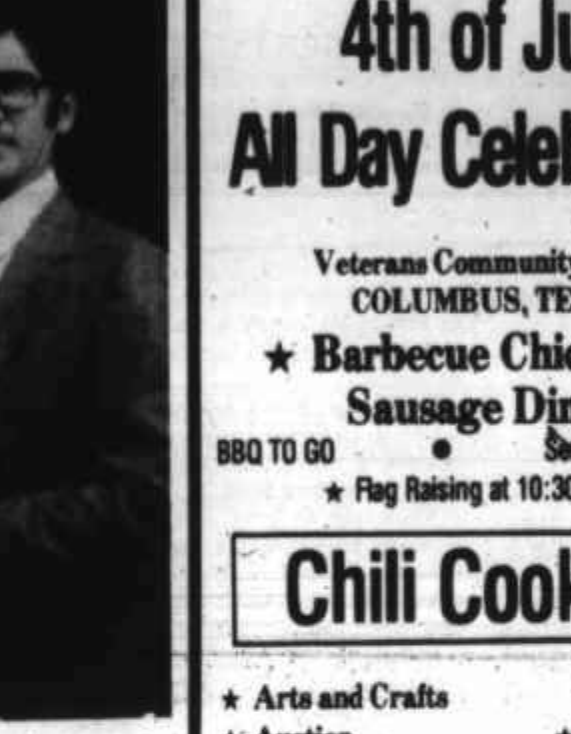

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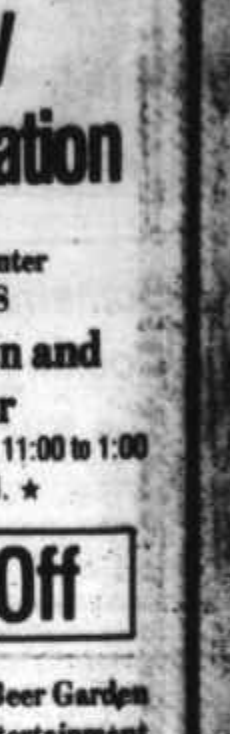
