

Miss Kathleen Louise Rees Is Bride of John Thompson

The Lehrer Memorial United Methodist Church was the setting for the double ring ceremony uniting Miss Kathleen Louise Rees and John Thompson on Saturday evening, June 7 at 7:00 o'clock. The Reverend Louis Sterling, pastor, officiated.

The bride is the daughter of Mrs. Melvin C. Rees and the late Mr. Rees of Garwood. Parents of the bridegroom are Mr. and Mrs. John Schuler Thompson, Sr.

at the altar by her brother, Carl Rees, II of Davisville, Rhode Island. For her wedding, the bride selected a white Alencon and organza dress designed by Priscilla of Boston. The gown featured a sweetheart neckline and cap sleeves. The Alencon lace covered the entire bodice and formed a scalloped edge around the neckline and cap sleeves. From the natural waist, the skirt fell to slipper length. Appliques of the lace were delicately sprinkled down the front of the skirt. The white organza completed the rest of the skirt and extended around into a chapel-length train. To enhance her attire, the bride chose a white Alencon lace-edged mantilla. The beautiful lace veil was caught to a semi-Juliet headpiece. From the headpiece, the veil flowed down the back of the gown to beyond the length of the train.

The bride carried a cascading bouquet of white roses, irises, daisies and baby's breath. Interspersed into the bouquet was a white silk handkerchief belonging to her paternal grandmother, and traditionally carried by other brides in the family. Attached to the handkerchief was a cameo, a childhood gift to the bride from her parents. In keeping with the tradition, the handkerchief served as something old. Something new was her dress and veil. For something borrowed, she wore a gold locket, given to her mother by her father during their courtship. The locket contained photographs of her father. A garter served as something blue.

Sister Is Attendant
Mrs. James Berger attended her sister as matron of honor. Her gown of yellow chiffon featured a fitted bodice with a capelet. A founce with a diagonal overlay completed the slipper-length skirt. She carried a nosegay of spruce. "Little Misses" were Rees and Carolyn Anna Berger, nieces of the bride, were the flower girls. Their white, floor-length gowns featured fitted bodices with puffed sleeves. The overskirts were caught up in scallops, held with clusters of

tiny pastel rosebuds. Satin ribbon formed the sash, one in pink and one in blue. In their hair they wore satin ribbon bows with small rosebuds in the streamers that fell to the necklines. Each carried a white wicker basket filled with spring flowers, and as they came down the aisle, they dropped tiny white silk flowers.

Serving the groom as best man was Carl Louis Bowden of Hobokenville. Ushers were James Edward Berger of Rosenberg, brother-in-law of the bride, and Milton Ray Alexander of Alvin, brother-in-law of the groom.

The bride's mother wore a floor-length gown of peach gina. A pleated skirt fell from the empire waistline. The sleeveless bodice was covered with a chiffon overlay attached at the waistline with a row of applique. Her corsage was of silk peach toned flowers.

The groom's mother wore a long sleeved floor-length gown of light blue gina. A rope of pearls attached at the neckline accented the empire waistline, and the skirt fell in soft gathers. Her corsage was of blue toned silk flowers.

Reception At Parry 1912
The reception following the ceremony was held at The Parry 1912 in Eagle Lake. Upon entering the hotel guests were registered by Mrs. Carl Rees, sister-in-law of the bride, at a table covered in a floor-length cloth of white satin with a lace overlay. Centering the table was a five-branch candelabra holding tall tapers. The bride's table was covered in floor-length ivory cloth with an ivory lace overlay. A silver compote held a massive arrangement of mixed summer flowers in shades of yellow and white. A large silver five-branch hurricane candelabra flanked the centerpiece.

The columned wedding cake, an all white confection which held sugarplum roses and was topped with white doves and lilacs of the valley, was at one end of the table. The silver punch service was at the opposite end. All silver appointments were used to serve a buffet of sliced ham

and turkey breast, assorted breads, various cheeses, crackers, cocktail sandwiches, and assorted summer fruits.

The groom's table in the Drummer's Room was covered in a pale tangerine floor-length cloth with a white eyelet overlay. Centering the table was a silver epergne holding mixed summer flowers and tall tapers. A silver coffee service was placed at one end of the table and the chocolate groom's cake decorated with a UT symbol and "Bevo" at the opposite end.

Champagne was served from the bar in the Drummer's Room.

For travel the bride wore a beige short-sleeved dress with a lace collar. Her ensemble was complemented by a string of pearls a gift of the groom. After a short wedding trip, the couple will be at home in Kingsville, where they both are members of the faculty of Texas A&I University.

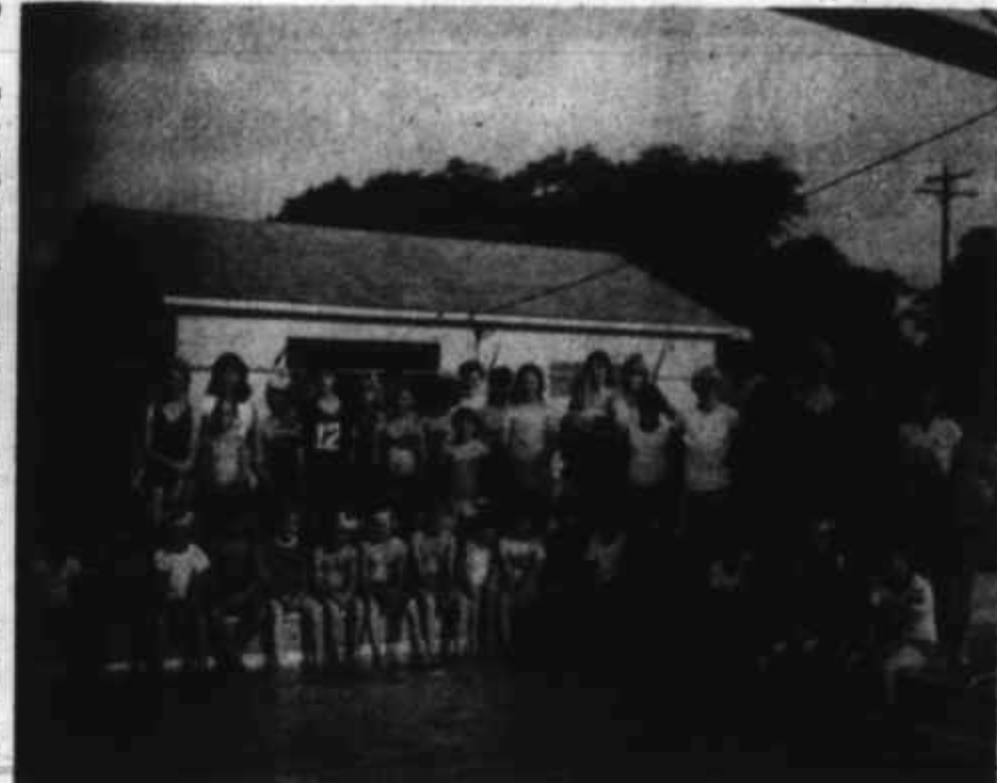
Mr. Jankowiak graduated from Reagan High School in 1969 and served in the U.S. Air Force. He is a sales representative for Natchez Steel.

MARKET REPORT

Columbus Commission Co.
The market was fully steady with a lot of demand on all classes of cattle at the sale last Thursday at Columbus Commission Livestock Co. Owners reported an extremely active sale with 666 head of cattle going up for bids.

Good to choice butcher calves and yearlings sold from 63 to 65; heiferette packer cows brought 50 to 60; commercial packer bulls sold 55 to 60. Heavy Hereford and Angus and Crossbred steer calves sold 70 to 85 and heifers 65 to 75. Good stocker cows and heifers went from \$400 to \$500 per head. No. 1 hogs sold 36 to 38.5 and lamba 50 to 75.

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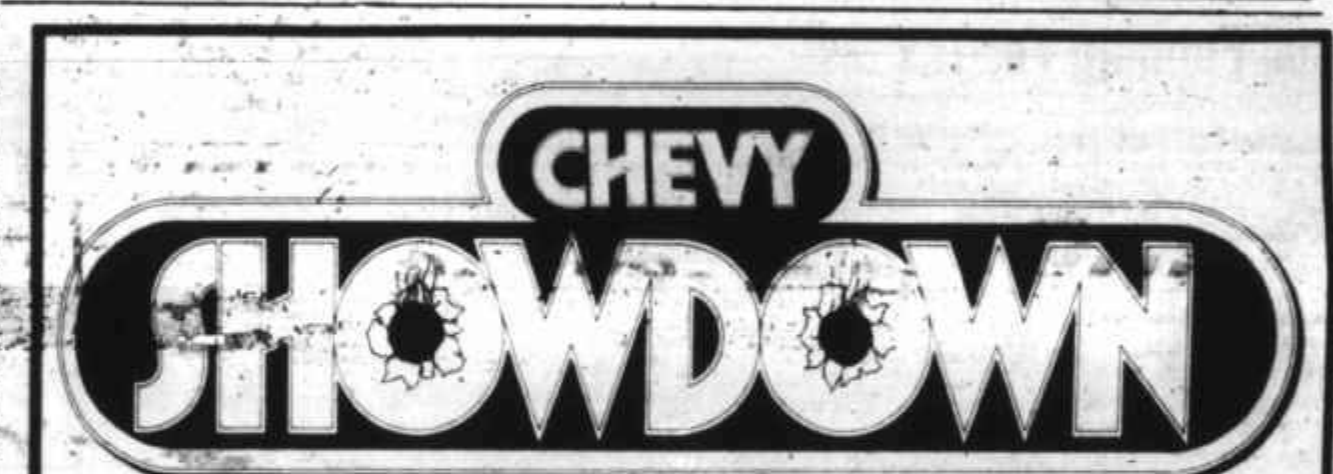
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
