For a fleeting moment, the Fiscal Year 1981 budget is balanced. The first budget resolution for FY '81 does contain a balance. But this "babe in wool" days may be numbered because of the recession and because of the tax cut handwagons.

We do not know how long the recession will be. For every three economists, there are five opinions. But a recession deals the economy a double whammy: it reduces tax revenues since less people are working, and it generates more unemployment and related benefits to be paid out.

An 84 year old Negro woman, Pearl Turner, was found dead at her home at 302 Allen Street Monday morning.

Assault Charged In Alletton Family Fuss

Colorado County sheriff's department received a call at 6:40 p.m. Sat., July 5 from Melvin Jones of Alletton that someone was threatening to shoot him. Upon investigation officers found that there had been a family squabble and Willie Stovall, Jr., 20, of Alletton had reportedly grabbed a rifle and threatened Jones. Stovall then hid the rifle under a church, but when he was arrested he led officers to the place where the gun was placed.

19- and 20-Year-Olds To Register

WASHINGTON - Congress cleared the way July 2nd for President Carter to order all 19- and 20-year-old men to register for the military draft this summer.

By a vote of 234 to 168, the House completed congressional action on a bill giving the Selective Service System the \$13.3 million it needs to conduct registration for the first time since 1975.

No Draft-Vet - The bill does not provide for resumption of the draft. But critics contend that building a standby pool of names and addresses is the first step in a move to bring back conscription.

Carter, who called for registration to show U.S. resolve in the face of Moscow's invasion of Afghanistan, is expected to issue an executive order within a week to carry out the program.

In late July or early August, 4 million young men will be required to go to a local post office to sign a registration form. The program will be spread over two weeks, with men born in 1960 registering the first week and those born in 1961 registering the second. During a week in January 1981 men born in 1962 will have to register. Thereafter, on a continuing basis, all males who turn 18 will be required to sign up.

No Women - Carrier wanted women included, but Congress rejected the idea by deleting \$1.5 million earmarked in the bill for it.

No Physical - The registration program does not include a physical examination and classification as to eligibility for service. Exemptions will be asked to give their name, address, date of birth, telephone number and Social Security number.
