Small Royalty Owners Attack Windfall Tax

Some 3,000 persons, including royalty owners, oilmen and three congressmen from Texas and Oklahoma, attended a hearing on the "Windfall Profits Tax" in the Super Drum in Austin on Thursday of last week and condemned the tax as "unfair, fraudulent and possibly unconstitutional."

"I've been to a lot of committee hearings, but I've never seen this kind of turnout before," said Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, along with the noisy crowd. Sen. Bentsen was quoted as commenting to Sen. David Boren, Okla., at his side during the meeting that "I want to tell you we'll be taking that message back to Washington."

Sen. Bentsen said the windfall profits tax "is bad fiscal policy because it places a 10-year, billion dollar tax burden on an economy that is already overtaxed; it is bad energy policy because it diverts billions of dollars from the search for new energy resources in this country."

Bentsen has reintroduced a bill to exempt royalty owners from the tax and exempt the first 1,000 barrels per day of production by independent operators. He and Boren, along with 28 other senators, also are supporting a proposal providing for a 10-barrel-a-day exemption for royalty owners.

The third congressman, Rep. J. J. (Jake) Pickle, D-Texas, described the tax as "harsh, unnecessary, unfair and ought to be repealed. You're being taxed proportionately more than the big boys."

Royalty owners are the big boys. They own the rights to give up to 70 cents on the dollar for each dollar over \$12.80 that a barrel of oil is sold for, said Thomas Petley, a Houston lawyer who inherited a share in a Conroe oil field.

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Health Alert - Don't Be A Heat Stroke Victim

Don't become a heat stroke victim during Texas' scorching heat wave.

Know the warning signs - and take action!

Most likely affected are older persons, the obese, the very young, alcoholics and people suffering from chronic diseases.

Warning Signs

When it's too hot, people can suffer heat exhaustion or heat stroke.

Heat stroke will kill, if you don't take immediate action. Heat exhaustion, on the other hand, usually is not life threatening.

* **HEAT STROKE**

Warning signs are reddened skin, fiery hot to the touch and dry.

The victim is obviously feverish but no longer perspiring.

The victim might be disoriented - or possibly unconscious.

Most heat stroke victims collapse.

Heat stroke victims can be suffering body temperatures up to and over 106 degrees F., because in cases of heat stroke, the body's normal cooling mechanisms have quit functioning.

* **HEAT EXHAUSTION**

Warning signs are pale skin that is cool and moist to the touch, and the body temperature is about normal.

The victim might be disoriented. A few heat-ex-

haustion victims do become unconscious and collapse.

Act Fast For Heat Stroke

Minutes count in cases of heat stroke.

Reduce the body temperatures at once.

Call for an ambulance or medical help, then start cooling the victim with whatever means you can find. Bathe him with cold water if possible.

Don't exercise just before or after meals.

Avoid sudden changes in temperature. For example, don't dash from an air-conditioned building to a hot car. Open the car up for a few minutes before getting into it.

Don't exercise strenuously in the sun or heat.

Comments Are Solicited On Waterfowl Seasons

Hunting season framework for ducks and geese in Texas are about the same for 1980-81 as they were in the previous year.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission will take final action on the proposed seasons in its August meeting in Austin, to be held during the last week of that month.

Hunters still have the opportunity to comment on the proposed seasons and bag limits during the remainder of July and August.

Written comments may be directed to Bill Brownlee, Migratory Game Program Director, Parks and Wildlife Department, 6200 Smith School Road, Austin, Texas 78744.

The seasons are set by the Parks and Wildlife Commission within frameworks established by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The proposed split season for ducks and geese in 1980-81 for most of the state is Nov. 8 through Nov. 30, and Dec. 13, 1980 through Jan. 18, 1981; from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

2 Suits Filed For Judgments On Unpaid Notes

Two suits seeking judgments for unpaid promissory notes were filed in District Court in Columbus this week.

In one filed July 16th, the First National Bank of Eagle Lake seeks judgment against Willis G. Otto and wife, Genevieve A. Otto, in the amount of \$5,136.82 for alleged unpaid principal and interest, plus attorney's fees and costs of court. Security listed was a 1978 Chevrolet Nova.

In the other suit filed July 21st, Mike Elliott, trustee seeks judgment from Herbert Schroeder, Jr. The suit seeks foreclosure on a promissory note issued Aug. 9, 1978 and lists as still owing \$18,750 plus interest and attorney's fees and costs of court.
