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Coal comes to South Texas

CPL turns to new fuel sources to generate electricity

Central Power and Light Company is now operating its first coal-fired power plant, Colet Creek Power Station.

Coal and nuclear plants will provide an increasingly large share of the electricity used by CPL customers - in the years ahead - more than 40% by the late 1980s. We must use these two fuels if we are to continue reliable service to South Texas.

Whether or not the Public Utility Commission of Texas has announced that it will not approve the construction of any new gas-fired plants for making electricity. And, the federal Coal and Nuclear Plant Siting Act of 1978 prohibits even existing power plants from using natural gas as a primary energy source after January 1, 1990.

Although Colet Creek is CPL's first coal-fired plant, it won't be the last. In fact, a second coal-fired plant, Colet Creek, is already on the drawing boards.

And, South Texas Project, the nuclear plant in which CPL is a participant, is scheduled to begin supplying power in the mid-1990s.

Future energy sources

In cooperation with research agencies and other utilities, CPL is studying three new possible energy sources for long-range use: gasification of solid or heavy fuels, nuclear fusion and geothermal.

Meanwhile, CPL must depend on new coal and nuclear plants to assure an adequate supply of electricity for its customers.
