Oil Drilling Costly
Average cost of drilling an oil or natural gas well in Texas is \$51.95 per foot, a 238% increase from 1970, according to Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Assn.

The calculation is based on figures from the Association's annual compilation of facts and figures on the Texas petroleum industry, titled "80 Facts About Texas Oil and Gas."

Voters To Decide Fate Of 9 Amendments On Nov. 4th

In the 1979 regular session, the Texas Legislature proposed 12 constitutional amendments for voter consideration. The nine proposals that will be submitted to voters at the general election on November 4, 1980, concern: (1) unannounced teller machines, (2) the state's right of appeal in criminal cases, (3) counties' participation in the single property tax appraisal and boards of equalization, (4) bingo games for charitable purposes, (5) budget execution powers for the governor, (6) removal of certain appointed officials, (7) county road work on private roads, (8) jurisdiction and authority of the courts of civil appeals, and (9) conversion of marital community property into separate property.

The other three amendments which were proposed by the 66th Legislature were voted on in the November, 1979, election. Two of the three were approved by voters: Amendment No. 1-authorizing the legislature to provide terms of office of notaries public and to specify the appointment of notaries public for the state instead of for each county (House Joint Resolution 108, passed by vote of 291-008 for and 153-271 against); Amendment No. 2-providing for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department (House Joint Resolution 133, failed by vote of 168-108 for and 227-200 against).

Amendment No. 3-authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas (Senate Joint Resolution 13, passed by vote of 240-005 for and 201-212 against).

Since adoption of the present Texas Constitution in 1876, the document has been amended 235 times while 378 proposed amendments have been submitted to voters. The nine proposals approved by the legislature for vote in 1980 bring the total number of amendments submitted to 387.

The Photographic Craftsman degree is earned for exceptional service to the profession - for teaching, lecturing and service to photographic associations. A photographer must be a member of the Association for a minimum of three years to be eligible for the Photographic Craftsman degree.

Photographers earn merits that can be applied toward the Photographic Craftsman degree. Most of the merits applied toward the Photographic Craftsman degree must be earned by teaching, speaking or participating in any photographic demonstration. A photographer may earn the remaining merits by participating in Association activities such as serving as an elected official, exhibit juror or as a program chairman. Written articles accepted by the Professional Photographer, official journal of PP of A, is yet another way of acquiring these merits.

The degree entitles the holders to add the initials "Cr. Photog." after their names and to wear the blue ribbon and medalion symbol of the award.

Drilling of a 10,000 foot oil and gas test, to be known as the No. 11 V. Duncan Ranch, was announced last week by Tomlinson Oil Co., Inc. and Mole Operating Co., Inc. of Houston. The well will be an outpost of the Thomas Field and will be on a 900-acre lease in the James Ross Survey, A-39, 1.3 miles northwest of Matthews, Texas. Production in the Thomas Field is at 2,200 and 2,250 feet in the Miocene and at 9,895 in the Wilcox.
