State Tax Board Reports On School Dist. Market, Index Value

At a State Capitol news conference last week, the executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB) released preliminary findings of the agency's just-completed study of 1979 market and index values of school districts.

Kenneth E. Graeber, head of the state's property tax administration agency, said the study provides the basis on which state funding will be allocated to public schools throughout Texas in the 1982-83 biennium. The study, mandated by Sec. 11.86 of the Texas Education Code, is conducted every two years to afford greater equity in the funding distribution.

"Our results are preliminary and school districts have a right to appeal the findings," Graeber said. Appeal petitions, which must be filed before Oct. 1, will be reviewed by an impartial appeals panel and the panel will hold a hearing for any school district upon request. One of the study's key findings was that taxable property values statewide increased 41 percent from 1977 until 1979.

Property Values Up
"We found property values on Jan. 1, 1979, of \$418.4 billion as compared to \$297.5 billion at the same time in 1977," Graeber said. Both figures exclude intangibles and household goods, property categories exempted from taxation by the legislature. Actual values reported on school district tax rolls as of Jan. 1, 1979, were \$254.3 billion according to data compiled by SPTB.

Graeber said it is presently impossible to determine how study results will impact individual school districts due to the fact that the legislature will use the study in conjunction with a new school finance bill. "The ultimate local fund

to tax vehicles or not. Graeber said there are several alternatives for handling the vehicle value question, with the final determination to be made by legislators.

2. How should productivity values of open space land be handled? Graeber noted that the law specifically required that an index value be calculated for each district which gives consideration to productivity valuation on land.

The problem, however, was that productivity valuation was not mandatory in 1979. "Therefore," Graeber said, "Two methods were utilized by the study to provide the legislature more complete information." One method, identified as "Index 1," gives credit only

for land which was actually qualified by school districts in 1979. "Index 2" gives credit for land which would have been qualified had the system been fully implemented.

According to the 1979 market value and index study, the Rice Consolidated School District's total market values are \$524,273,388; Index 1 totals, are explained in above paragraph, were \$524,273,388; and Index 2 values totaled \$568,207,382.
