Pickle's Solar Energy Bill Has Hearing

A bill co-sponsored by Central Texas Cong. J. J. (Jake) Pickle to help pave the way for increased use of solar energy was the subject of a hearing in the nation's capital this week.

The House Ways and Means Committee on Sept. 8 considered a measure whereby a tax credit would be allowed for builders of new houses that have "passive solar" designs and equipment.

Active solar entails the addition of panels and improvements to a house. Passive solar incorporates structural aids into the design of a house to reduce the need for heating and cooling.

Under the Pickle-sponsored measure, a tax break would be given a builder who would pass on the break as a reduction in the purchase of a new house. The homeowner would then enjoy the benefits of lowered utility bills each month.

Pickle's legislative efforts in Washington during recent months have been particularly devoted to the economy and to energy. He says he feels especially compelled to address these two major issues since he receives continuing information from his district that these are presently the primary concerns of his constituents.

Pickle believes that solar energy can become a useful alternative source of energy for our nation. He also is working to encourage additional development of geothermal and fusion energy, as well as seeing that America's still-vast resources in oil and gas, coal and lignite are developed with government encouragement rather than red tape.

Soybeans Here To Stay, Craigmiles

The traditional Midwest crop of soybeans has invaded the once-dominated rice country along Texas' Gulf Coast.

"And soybeans are here to stay," commented Dr. Julian P. Graigmiles, at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center's annual Soybean Field Day, Sept. 3.

In about a decade soybean plantings along the Gulf Coast climbed to 450,000 acres, in excess of half the state's 800,000 acres.

Craigmiles, resident director of research at the A&M Center, noted that soybeans have stood the extremes of weather conditions - a record wet season last year and currently the driest summer since records were started in 1914 - to prove that soybeans are a rugged and versatile crop which "can pull through" during adverse conditions.

Soybeans are a high source of vegetable protein for human and animal nutrition, and in big demand in most countries of the world.

"Even with the dry summer we still estimate 22 bushels per acre for the coming harvest," Craigmiles said, "down 10 to 20 percent this year. Recent rain showers helped the crop recover some of the expected loss in yield."

"Price currently is in the \$7.30 to \$8 per bushel" range.

A Book Review Of "Von Ryan's Return"

The best-selling "Von Ryan's Express" introduced one of the great characters of war fiction; now the redoubtable Colonel Joseph "Von" Ryan returns to action, teaming up with a witty, witty contessa in a desperate attempt to expose a Nazi plot aimed at devastating the Allies in Italy.

Chafing in neutral Switzerland after his spectacular escape from the Germans via a hijacked prison train, Ryan eagerly accepts an OSS directive to find and eliminate a dangerous German infiltrator among northern Italy's partisan bands. There is no hint, as Ryan scores a bloody victory over the impostor, that a far greater challenge is in store with the fate of several allied armies at stake. Stalled in enemy territory, Ryan heads the last words of his mortally wounded OSS guide and seeks the mysterious Contessa di Montalba for aid in reaching Allied lines to the south. So it is that the iron-willed Colonel finally meets his match in the most unlikely, entirely irresistible accomplice he has ever had, one whose acid tongue is more than equal to his own.

When the contessa learns of a huge secret German offensive, only days away, that could decimate the Allies, Ryan's intended trek becomes a deadly race against time as he and the contessa press south into snowbound mountains and the heart of the massive German buildup, gambling that they can outwit and outrun the Nazis, save themselves, and prevent looming catastrophe.

Alive with rapid-fire action and the crackling exchanges of its unforgettable characters, "Von Ryan's Return" is a rousing, triumphant sequel to its blockbuster predecessor.
