**Award-Winning
Film At Bapt.
Church Sunday**

"No Longer Alone", winner of three prestigious film industry awards, will be shown on Sunday, Sept. 21st at the First Baptist Church in Eagle Lake. The showing, open to the public free of charge, is scheduled to begin at 7:30 p.m., said the Rev. Melburn Sibley, pastor of the church.

The film, a true story, takes a close look at a woman who was searching desperately for love and acceptance, but whose cries went unheard by those who surrounded her.

Originally released by World Wide Pictures in motion picture theatres, the film is now one hour in length in preparation for its eventual presentation as a television special.

"No Longer Alone" traces the life of an English actress, Joan Winmill Brown. Though she skyrocketed to fame on the British stage, her life was marked by a frantic grasp for personal fulfillment and love. Tormented by a past she was unable to forget, she succumbed to a series of nervous breakdowns; and, at one point, attempted to take her own life.

In her ultimate moment of despair, Joan was invited by a "chance" phone call to attend a Billy Graham crusade. It was here that she first discovered her worth as an individual and began her long struggle to piece her shattered life back together.

Those who have followed Billy Graham's ministry will be interested to know that Dr. Graham appears in the film in some of the footage of his 1964 London Crusade, and also in the introduction and conclusion to the film, photographed recently for this special version.

According to William F. Brown, President of World Wide Pictures, "No Longer Alone" was presented with the "Award of Excellence" from Religion in Media in America, as the outstanding religious film of the year. It also received the "Silver Halo Award" from the Southern California Motion Picture Council.

"No Longer Alone" was filmed in color on location in London, and stars Belinda Carroll, Wilfrid Hyde Yates, James Fox, Samantha Gates, and Gordon DeVol. Simon Williams, who has one of the leading roles in the BBC production "Upstairs, Downstairs", also stars in the film. The title song was performed by the popular recording artist, B. J. Thomas.

**Work-at-Home
Schemes -
Just Dreams?**

Are work-at-home schemes sound business opportunities, or are they just dreams? The promotion sounds

**Inviting "make big bucks
while working at home" or
"money-make \$1,000 in 30
days."**

However, consumers interested in this type of promotional advertising should also be alert to the pitfalls of work-at-home schemes.

Most promotions are aimed at the elderly, shut-ins, the unemployed and homemakers wishing to supplement their family income.

Work-at-home schemes do not guarantee regular salaries, employment or a market for the product.

They do, however, require an investment of money before any instructions or work plans are even sent. Often the work continues the fraud by getting other people involved.

The most common type of offer is for envelope stuffing, making baby booties or making aprons.

The U.S. Postal Inspection Service is charged with investigating violations of the Mail Fraud Statute. It is highly unlikely that there will be a great demand for hand-addressed or hand-stuffed envelopes in this day of highly automated business, they warn.

Because of the increasing number of work-at-home schemes, the Postal Inspection Service will provide information about questionable work-at-home promotions.

They are also interested in knowing about victims of unscrupulous promoters.

The tractor was a 1975 Ford pickup truck driven by Earl Dabney of Garwood and owned by Larry K. Ranch. The report showed that the

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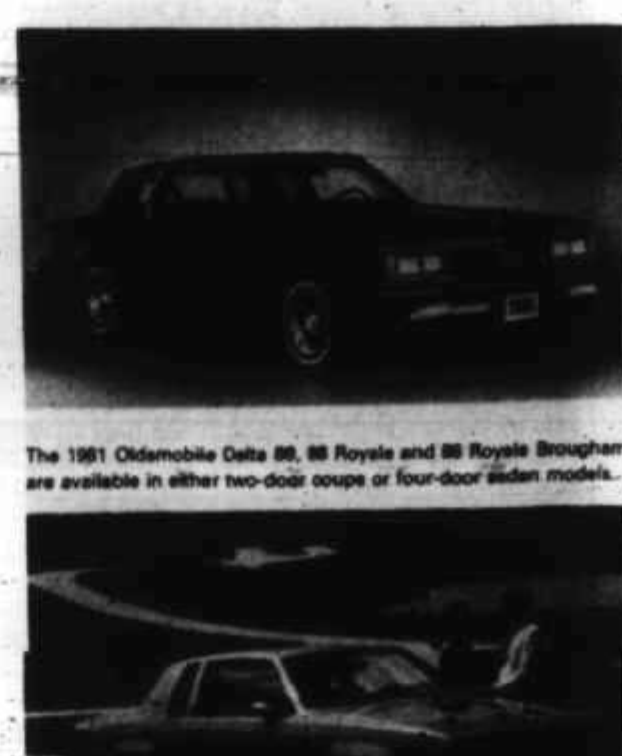

Twenty-three 1981 models, ranging from the compact Omega to the personal luxury Toronado, represent Oldsmobile's most fuel-efficient fleet yet.

The 1981 model Oldsmobiles will go on display at Lake Motors, Inc. in Eagle Lake on Thursday, Sept. 25th. Owner Joe Reed invites you to make plans to attend. There will be free favors and registrations, without obligation, for door prizes.

The division's sales-weighted fleet fuel economy average for 1981 is estimated at 22.5 miles per gallon. That is nearly seven miles better than Oldsmobile's fleet fuel economy average for 1979.

There are two fewer models than at the end of the 1980 model year. Cancelled are the Cutlass Sedan and Cutlass Sedan Brougham coupes. Starfire models were discontinued last December.

Here is a rundown on the 1981 lineup:

Omega: The compact Omega is available in four models with four special styling options. The 1981 models carry over many of the popular styling features of last year's Omega and incorporate new grille and tail lamp design.

* Cutlass: Eight models are available in the 1981 Cutlass series including Cutlass sedan, Cutlass Supreme sedan, Cutlass LS sedan, Cutlass
