Bond Election For Sewer Plant Funds Subject Of Meet Tues.

[By Jeff Franks] Eagle Lake city council will hold a special meeting next Tuesday, Sept. 30th to take action on calling a proposed bond election for the construction of a Water Treatment Plant.

The proposal, if approved, would call for a \$350,000 bond election to be held on October 25th. The amount proposed will be used to cover the city's share (25%) of the project costs. A federal grant will fund the remaining amount (75%) of the \$1,200,000 proposed plant construction cost.

The project is the third step in a grant awarded to

the city several years ago. Bernard Johnson, the project engineer, and a representative of Monterey, Beiser and Co., the city's financial advisor, will meet with the council next week to help make arrangements for the election.

Registration for these classes will be held at the Masses on the weekends for the next two weekends, September 27 and 28th and October 4 and 5th. Further details will follow. Classes will begin on October 15th.

Entex Takes Over Gas System Here Thursday

Entex is purchasing the system for \$100,000 and will present a check to Mayor Elmer Strass for that amount during the Thursday morning meeting.

As of that inspection, according to the bill of sale, Entex will assume full liability for the system except for any liability that may have been outstanding prior to the transfer.

No Increase For 3 Years In the rate schedule approved, it was stipulated that no rate increase would be made here for at least three years, as had been earlier agreed upon. The schedule also includes a residential gas air-conditioning incentive which would give residential customers lower gas rates during the months of July through October.

Entex expects to locate an office here by Thursday morning and will assume the same phone number that had been used while the city had operated the gas system.
